



dents at grade crossings, than in any year since 1931." This situation did not prevail in Connecticut in 1935 or upon any part of the New Haven Railroad system, but it serves to show the potential danger of train-auto crashes when ordinary caution is not exercised.

If drivers would use the same amount of precaution in passing a railroad grade crossing that they abould and usually do bring into play in crossing an ordinary street intersection, there would be no such thing as train-out smash-ups, rail officials declare. There are less than 130 rail crossings at grade on the Connecticut Trunk Line and Ald systems of highways, and every one of them is protected by flashing red signal lamps which are flashed off and on continuously when a train is within approximately hair a mile of the crossing. When these red signals are flashing, motorists should stop and make no attempt to proceed over the rails. Every crossing, whether on the main system of highways or not, is definitely marked with warning signs. In addition, locomotive engineers are required to sound their whistles for a prolonged period and to repeat until the grade crossing is reached, so that ample warning of a train's approach is given.

In other words, they hit trains that are actually on the crossings, by passing watchmen, ignoring warnings, and breaking through lowered crossing gates.

From the Public Acts of 1935

If any Tax laid by a municipality upon a registered motor vehicle shall remain unpaid sixty days after the due date of such Tax, the Tax Collector of such municipality shall forthwith notify the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles of such delinquency, the amount of such Tax and date when such Tax was due. The Commissioner of Motor Vehicles shall forthwith suspend or revoke the registration of such Motor Vehicle. No such registration shall be reinstated until a receipt evidencing the payment of such Tax shall have been presented to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles or satisfactory evidence that the obligation has been legally discharged.
