nally opposed to the stability of government and to democratic government itself.

State's responsibilities

Stressing again the necessity of the Federal Government taking a hand to cure economic evils when they get beyond state control, the President added:

"The more progressive of the states may do their share, but unless the action of the states is substantially uniform and simultaneous, the effectiveness of reform is nullified—crippled by the states who, like many other evil-doers, will say 'no'."

Urging extension of his "good neighbor" policy, the President said: "I have taken great happiness in the last few days in the issuing of executive orders which I regard as every last one of them."

"You in Texas who have undertaken to fight for hundreds of miles along those of our sister Republic Mexico, can well understand what the good neighbor policy means throughout the Americas.

"We seek to banish war in this hemisphere; we seek to extend those practices of good will and closer friendship upon which peace is based.

SHORTAGE OF TOMATO PLANTS NOTED HERE

Frost and Bugs Have Killed Off Many Early Plants — Getting Them Out of State.

Frost and potato bugs did so much damage to tomato plants in Manchester this spring that there was a shortage of plants. Hot houses and stores that have sold tomato plants in large numbers in the past found there was a shortage. As a result of the shortage locally some of the dealers here found it necessary to buy plants to supply the demand, from out of the state.

Nearly every day this week there have been shipments of tomato plants coming into Manchester by express and in each case where the plants have been consigned they have been sold, making necessary the ordering of more.

Local growers of tomato plants are not in an unusual condition outside this year. They say that the potato bug is eating tomato plants, in some cases growers claim it is the first time that such a condition has existed. The lady bug, as it is called, has laid eggs on tomato leaves and these hatched out into potato bugs, that have started eating the plants, resulting in many being killed. It is about 40 years since this kind of a blight has afflicted tomato plants in this section. The out-of-state plants that are being brought in by express, as it is not arriving too late to be planted for a crop this year, but there will be a later crop than usual.

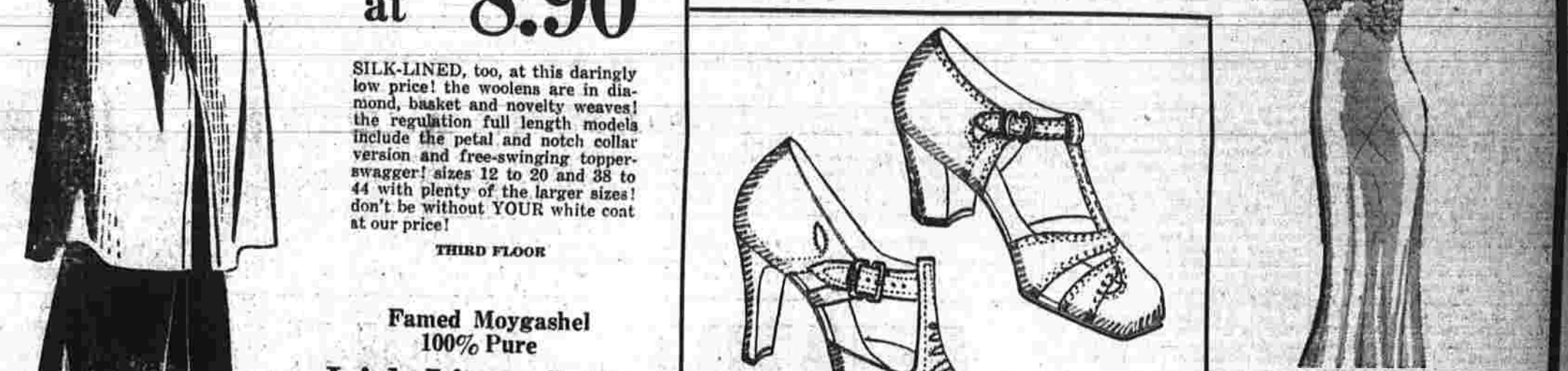

Records of Town Clerk Trace Life Story of Hundreds Here

From Cradle to Grave Official Has Facts About Everyone.

Model Office Praised Far and Wide for Fine Equipment.

From the cradle to the grave most of the major events in the lives of residents of Manchester are recorded by Town Clerk Samuel J. Turkington somewhere among the various files in his Municipal building office and vault.

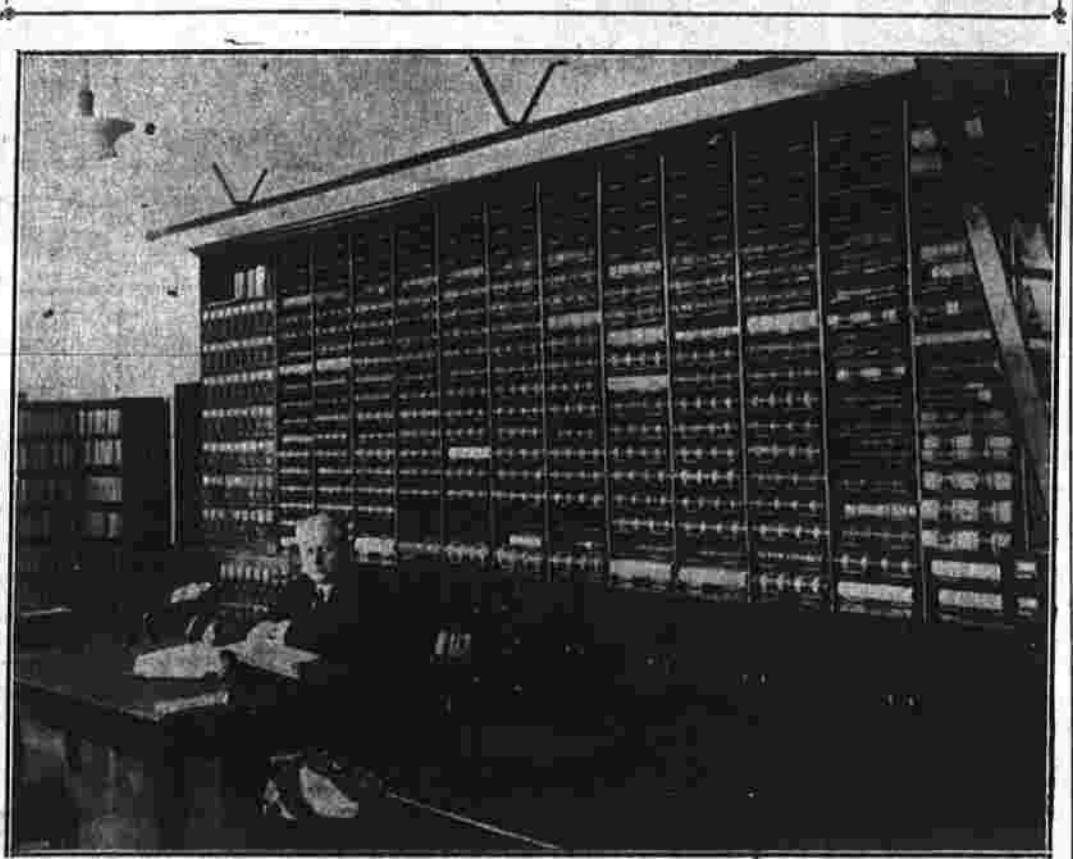
Milestones recorded by Mr. Turkington as town clerk include the birth certificate, which occasionally is followed a few days later with a change of the baby's name from the one given first.

From Town Clerk's Business Records. Arrival at manhood and womanhood is usually noted, as persons are made voters some after they are 21 years of age. Marriages mark another step along the life record, the accumulation, transfer and loss of property and wealth along the way, causes in some cases, numerous entries in the file.

Senior citizens are noted in more or less regular sequence, with the record being closed with filing of the certificate of death. The town clerk's report that interested parties should make transfers of property by means of deeds or distribution and permits for disinterment in some cases follow in a continuous manner.

In the case of less than 100,000 people, the records of the town clerk are not only a source of information but also a source of pride. The records are kept in a model vault that has been praised by lawyers and officials all over the state for its utility, neatness, fire light and orderliness. Above is a picture of a section of the vault showing Town Clerk Samuel J. Turkington at work at one of the many tables arranged for the convenience of users of the vault.

Markham of Hartford, Hartford County, Conn. Mr. Markham checks the vital statistics records filed in the town clerk's office while Mr. Bowers make periodic surveys of the land records to assure that they are correctly indexed. Both have completed Manchester's clerk for the excellent way in which the Manchester records are maintained.

The Municipal building was constructed 10 years ago and was opened for use ten years ago next day. The clerk's quarters include a large "front office," a spacious vault, on the first floor and a large second-floor vault in the basement. The vault is protected from damage or loss from thieves, fire or other sources by brick walls, airtight-proof glass steel window curtains and double steel doors. The equipment and furnishings in the vault are metal or other fireproof materials.

The more than 100 huge volumes of land records are stacked away in an open file which takes up nearly all of the west wall of the vault. They are so arranged that the latest volumes are on the lowest shelves and the oldest on the top.

Special kinds of ink and typewriter ribbons are used to assure the records to assure them of long life. All the records in the clerk's office show that the clerk has made every effort to keep the records up to date. The town clerk's office has been praised by lawyers and officials all over the state for its utility, neatness, fire light and orderliness. The town clerk is elected at the annual town meeting of years not divisible by two, for a term of two years. Candidates for election must be citizens of the state and qualified voters of the town at the time of the election. The town clerk takes office the first Monday in January following his election.

He is given the oath of office by the moderator at the meeting at which he is elected.

Elected in October, 1925, Mr. Turkington took office the first Monday of the following January. In the fall of 1928 he moved, with other town officials from the Hall of Records, which is now the police station, to the new Municipal building.

The town clerk receives no salary. His office is entirely supported by fees charged for recording land records, issuing marriage, dog, hunting and fishing licenses and performing other services.

He has his own assistants and also appoints a deputy registrar of vital statistics.

The clerk is an information bureau for other municipal officials and many other citizens, local and from out of town. A large amount of his daily mail and many of his daily visitors have requests for data of some kind or other.

Mr. Turkington was preceded in office by Dudley Woodbridge, 1823-1925; George W. Cheney, 1825-1860; William Jones, 1860-1884; Ralph E. Phelps, 1884-1889; Ralph Cheney, 1889-1925; Rufus R. Dimock, temporary; Daniel Woodworth, 1885-1893; Sanford M. Benton, 1893-1928.

SOVIETS PROPOSE NEW CONSTITUTION

Government Control to Be Passed Over to Two Parliament Like Groups.

Moscow, June 12.—(AP)—Members of the all-Russian Congress of Soviets looked forward today to a new constitution for the Soviet Union.

The new plan of governmental organization, formulated under the personal direction of Dictator Joseph Stalin, already has been approved by the Presidium of the Supreme Council, known as the Council of Nationalities.

Four Year Terms. Members of the two bodies are to serve four-year terms. In the event the two legislative chambers fail to agree, authority is granted to the Presidium of the Supreme Council to dissolve the Parliament and call a new election.

The Constitution proposed these additional features: Creation of five new Republics, splitting up the old Trans-Caucasian Republic to make a total of 11 compared with the present seven.

Guarantees of freedom of speech and press. Suffrage rights for all citizens over 18 years old regardless of race, social position, religious belief, previous activities or property ownership.

Guarantees to all citizens of the right of employment and payment for labor in proportion to the quantity and quality of work performed.

Establishment of a judicial system. Only a government of laws, not men, can rescue us from its plight. The purpose of the tariff is to protect workers and industry from the cheap competition of foreign labor. The farmer should be given this same protection.

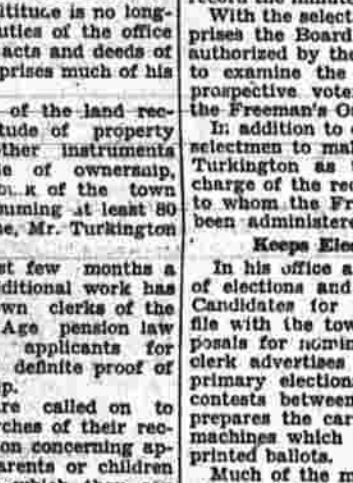

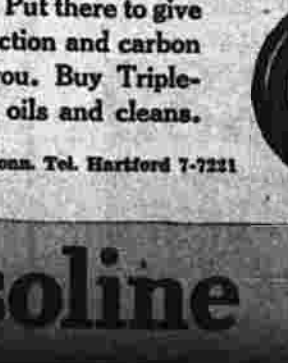

Olympic Preview 'Olympic Games, A Thing Apart,' Unharmed By Diplomatic Crises

First in a series of five daily stories. Berlin, June 11 (AP)—Neither recurrent crises in Europe's diplomatic affairs, nor organized and sometimes violent opposition by labor and pro-Jewish elements in the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin. A general feeling has grown up throughout Europe that the Olympics are something apart, that only a catastrophe can interfere.

A survey by The Associated Press suggests that every European nation, excepting Russia and Lithuania, is training athletes and buying financial plans of some sort to participate in the great August carnival in Berlin. The Soviet Union has only intimated its intention to participate. The Games, so far as the United States is concerned, are being watched with interest. The American Olympic committee is sending a delegation of "observers" to Berlin.

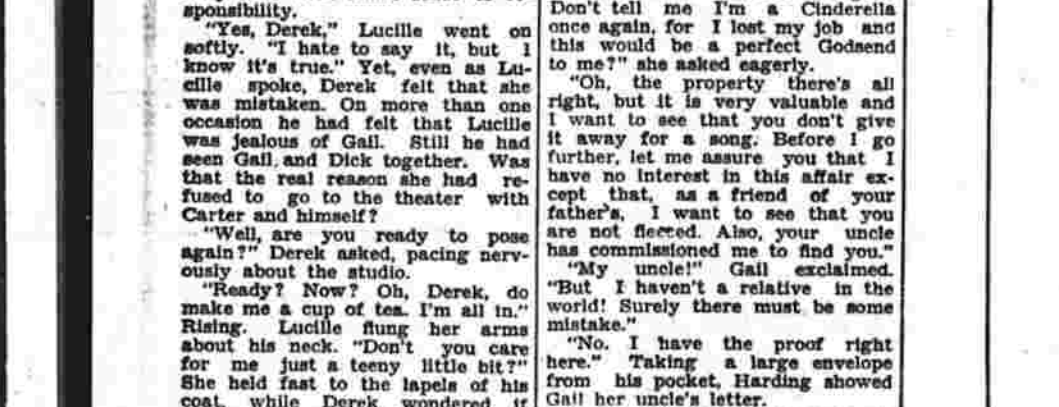
