RIOTING RESUMED IN PARIS STREETS

100 Persons Hurt During Memorial Services at Tomb of Unknown Soldiers' Unknown

Paris, July 6.—(AP)—Street fights between rioting Nationalists and police left almost 100 persons injured today.

The disorders climaxed a memorial ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier yesterday led by Colonel Francois de la Rocque, chief of the dissolved Croix de Feu League transformed into the new "Social" political party.
