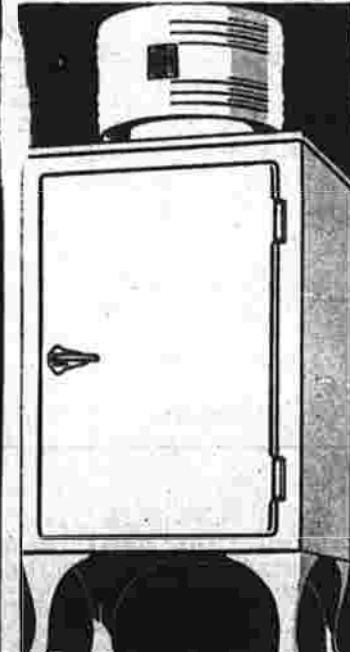

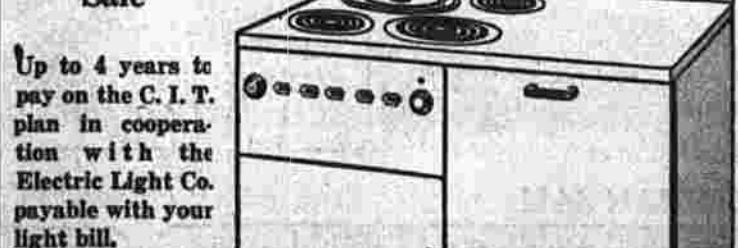

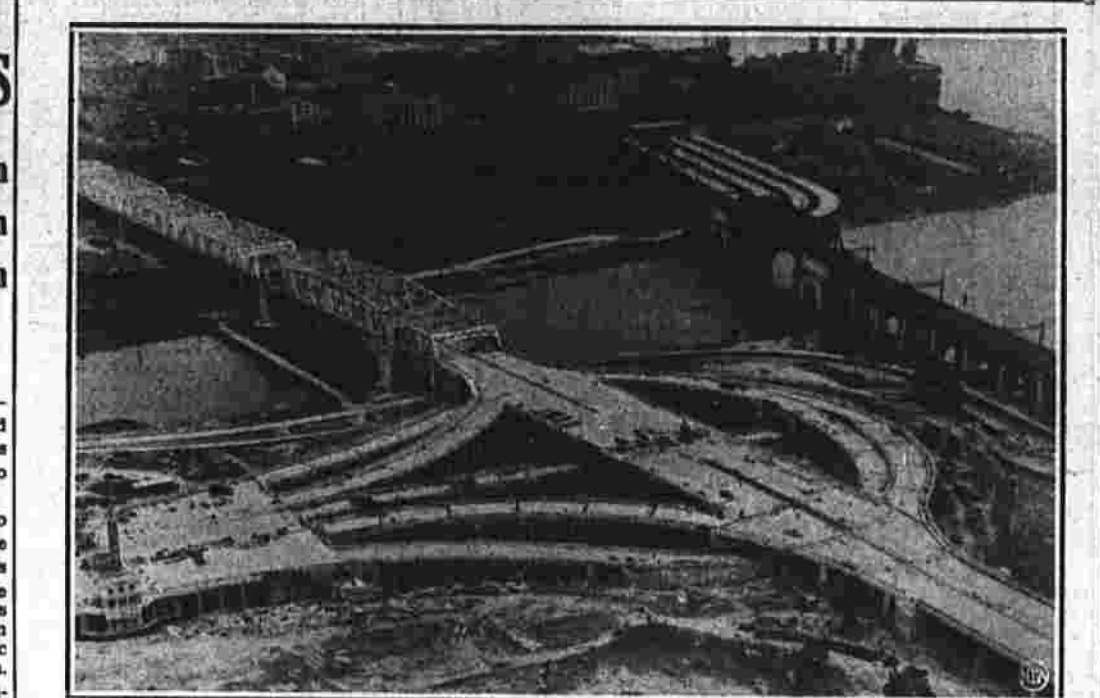

It was not until the 13th century that the people of this country began to think of themselves as a nation. Before that time they were a collection of warring tribes and petty kingdoms. The struggle for independence was a struggle for the right to be a nation.

There was another grave question. The revolution, like all wars, cost money. The young republic had no money. It had to borrow. It had to issue bonds. It had to raise taxes. It had to do everything that a government has to do to survive.

Business interests generally wanted a strong central government. They wanted a government that would protect their property and their interests. They wanted a government that would be strong enough to deal with the world.
