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**PUBLIC NUISANCES**

It is inevitable that the liberal application of the Townsend pension idea, as was embodied in the first McCreary bill—the first \$200 a month for everybody over 60—will have to be gotten out of the minds of some millions of persons in the United States before the great question of old age security is ever properly solved. In fact it is probably safer well out of the minds of plenty of those who rate themselves still as Townsendians. But there is no remedy of rationalism in connection with this subject more initial to an enlightened understanding of the matter than those who declare the Townsend plan to be a "crusade" and themselves proceed to attempt to hook the whole country by opposing to it figures indubitably more untrue than any ever advanced by Dr. Townsend or his supporters.

Representative Booth of Illinois, a member of the "investigating" committee that was headed by that gangster politician Rep. Bell of Kansas City, is the latest to cry over the cruelty of the Townsend "hoax" and to use the hackneyed and sentimental phrase that was introduced into the hearings by so-called economists obviously ignorant of common arithmetic. A ten cent loaf of bread, he declares, would cost nearer 50 cents, under Townsendism.

It would not—and will be known by those who follow the Townsend plan. But so honest opponents of Townsendism would employ such figures as those used by Booth—and by plenty of others who, like him, weep over the cruelty of the "hoax."

We always feel a little bitterly about this kind of attacks on old age pension proposals because they do a great deal of harm. They make it extremely difficult for sincere critics of the plan to discuss the subject in any effect. The ignorance or outright dishonesty of this type of opponent of Townsendism cannot possibly be exceeded by that of any two-hundred-month shoemaker, no matter how foolish or insincere the latter may be. This business of old age security is basic. It makes not the slightest difference whether Townsendism turns out a prophet or a rogue, the subject which he dragged into the light to see that will never dawn until it has been worked out and solved.

The Bels and the Scotts, who are trying to suppress it with lies more wildly ridiculous than any Townsend claim could possibly be, are making public nuisances of themselves. NIGHTMARE EVIDENCE. A good deal of anti-government propaganda, most of it undoubtedly spontaneous and unrealistic, is making its way into this country in the form of interviews with bewildered foreign refugees from the frenzied Spanish revolution.

It is probably not to be expected that Americans of the class who can afford to spend their time in European travel or in extended foreign residence—in some case preferring to live in Southern France, Italy or Spain rather than in this country—would be more sympathetic with the cause of the leftist Spanish government than with the

rightist revolutionaries, and that their sympathies in this business should extend to the rebels rather than to the supporters of the popular government. Nevertheless it is doubtful whether such sympathies are likely to make the stories told by refugees very dependable evidence as to what is going on in the business of Spain. The children of Spain and women who peeped through the shutters of a Malaga hotel and saw turmoil in the streets felt about "children" shooting and stabbing to death scores of priests and Fascists who are counterparts are to be found in many a European conscript army. As a matter of fact very few people, having no special training and keeping their heads and controlling their powers of observation and interpretation, are able to draw a reliable picture of any such scenes of tragic turbulence as many of these refugees have been through. They have been living in a nightmare—and it is seldom that the victim of nightmare can describe it, afterward, with any degree of exactitude. Civil war is always more horrible than intended. This war is being conducted without quarter. Almost all its participants have adopted the insane policy of endeavoring to frighten the loyalists out of resistance by proclaiming the purpose of executing those who resist them—and by actually doing so in a large number of instances. It was inevitable that the more sane supporters should retaliate in kind and go even further.

This is not "civilized" warfare any more. The World War was civilized, or the war in Ethiopia. Those gentle souls who are horrified by the bloody frenzy of the present war are those who are not understanding of the matter that those who declare the Townsend plan to be a "crusade" and themselves proceed to attempt to hook the whole country by opposing to it figures indubitably more untrue than any ever advanced by Dr. Townsend or his supporters.
