 ment of France, whatever the de-  
 gree of its radicalism, certainly is  
 far enough to the left to have its  
 sympathies run more to a red gov-  
 ernment in Spain than to a Fascist  
 one, even if it were to be the only  
 Fascist neighbor.

But French government spokes-  
 men point out that if Spain were to  
 go Fascist, France would be practi-  
 cally surrounded by dictatorships  
 of that persuasion.

So it is not surprising that French  
 newspapers are beginning to report  
 rumors that Italy has supplied Ger-  
 man France with supplies and that  
 Germany has sent him at least  
 one high-powered plane. That's  
 what the Blum government would  
 naturally want in order to provide  
 itself with an excuse for permitting  
 the shipment of material to the  
 Spanish government.

Of course it was always too much  
 to expect that the various European  
 governments would long be mem-  
 bers of the Spanish pie. That's  
 why, from the first days of the  
 Iberian civil war, there has been  
 so much apprehension. His talk  
 of nevertheless felt, that Spain  
 already have lighted the fuse of the  
 European powder magazine.

# DECLARIES PUBLIC NEGLECT OF POLLUTION PROBLEMS

### State Sanitary Engineer Puts Correction of Abuses Squarely Up to People

Cites New Haven and Bridgeport As Bad Spots in the State.

Reviewing the situation with respect to sewage pollution of the state's inland waters throughout Conn., the sanitary engineer, in an article appearing in the current monthly bulletin of the State Department of Health, Warren J. Scott, director of the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering, has criticized the officials of municipalities which have installed treatment plants to solve their sewage problems.

Public support is needed to force installation of necessary additional sewage treatment plants, and also to provide the necessary funds to qualify personnel to operate these plants. The protection of our bathing beaches, shellfish areas and public water supplies is a matter of the avoidance of nuisance conditions of the bacteriological pollution of natural resources—all demand this, the director says.
