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### SATURDAY DRIVERS WORST OFFENDERS

### Week-end Autoists Caused 39 P. C. of All Fatal Accidents in State in 1935.

Hartford, Conn., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The week-end operators of automobiles accounted for 39 per cent of the fatal accidents in Connecticut last year, and contrary to general opinion the Saturday driver was the worst of them all.

A comprehensive study of the state's 1935 traffic accident statistics, gathered by WPA workers, disclosed today that the most fatal fatalities occurred among Saturday operators than on Sunday.

The report, issued by the safety education section of the State Department of Motor Vehicles, pointed out:

"It would seem that the week-end operators with no business care to occupy their minds would operate their motor vehicles in a safe manner, due to the fact that there is much more traffic on these two days."

However, the records clearly point out that the times that operators should be giving their best efforts to driving are apparently the times they become reckless operators.

A total of 159 fatal accidents took place on Saturdays in 1935 while 145 took place on Sundays. In all, 647 motor vehicle fatalities were recorded.

Fridays, Thursdays, Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays ranked in that order as days when the least fatalities occurred on the state's highways.

August, 1935, held the record for the worst month last year. More than 60 per cent of the fatalities in 1935 occurred during the last six months of the year.

### DROUGHT AREA RELIEF ROLLS INCREASING

### Tugwell Says Most of \$10,000,000 Resettlement Money Used; Major Task Still Ahead.

Fred Park, N. Y., Aug. 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt studied today a report from Rexford G. Tugwell saying the administration has just begun to scratch the surface in expanding aid to drought-stricken farmers.

Participating in a conference with Federal officials, the undersecretary of agriculture and the assistant administrator said last night the major part of the relief relief task remained ahead.

The resettlement administration, he said, is concentrating direct relief grants of \$18.50 a month in the Dakotas, Montana and Wyoming, hit most severely by hot sun and drought.

The work now is "bringing into action," he added, in other states where the agricultural population has designated drought counties.

Among other things, the department is making arrangements for the resettlement administration to purchase land for use as farm crops that can be harvested this season.

Setting up machinery for purchasing and shipping feed into the drought regions will be the first step in the department's operation by locating suitable supplies for farmers and dealers.

Assisting farm women to make the best use of their food supplies with particular attention to nutrition, is another task.

Establishing an information service for farmers desiring to move to new land.

The department of agriculture, Tugwell said, is directing the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation to buy cattle to relieve any glut on the market and making the best available use of the surplus.

Like the direct relief operations, Tugwell said, "these activities are being carried out by the department of agriculture."

He had no estimate of the ultimate cost of the program, but said most of the \$10,000,000 appropriated for the resettlement administration so far had been used and probably more than a fourth of the money had gone for "regular" operations of the administration.

The supplying of relief grants will begin about the first of September, he said, and will be carried in North Dakota alone.

"The resettlement administration," he said, "is providing this relief only until the fall when the farmers' employment."

The WPA end of the drought-aid job, he said, is just now beginning to gather momentum.

Meanwhile, he added, "relief rolls are increasing very rapidly" as the drought dips farther into the corn belt.
