

**CHENEY-ROGERS PACT**

London, Aug. 6.—(AP)— Democratic, thrifty Queen Withelmina of the Netherlands may end 38 years of ruling her country next year.

The end of her reign was predicted by the London Daily Herald which said it "probably" will come after the projected marriage of her buxom daughter, Princess Juliana, to Prince Charles of Sweden.

The London newspaper declared the Queen "has decided to abdicate" and at the same time forecast announcement of the engagement of Juliana and Charles.

The way for the royal marriage has been cleared, the Herald asserted, by a proposed amendment to the Dutch constitution. This new law would reduce the Queen's civil income by approximately \$135,000 anually in favor of any prince consort.

The newspaper added the prediction Juliana will succeed to the throne, taking Charles as her consort.

In Amsterdam neither official confirmation nor denial could be obtained to the declaration. Informed quarters asserted the belief such action, however, was unlikely.
