That the administration has made a magnificent bundle of its extraordinary powers can be proved over and over again. The most economic business movement in their obvious wrong thinking and that it has promised no thing and done something exactly opposite, times without number, can be seen from the record; that its utter program of today bears no relationship whatever to the program outlined in Roosevelt's inaugural address, on the strength of which Congress granted these so-called "dictatorial powers," is something concerning which there can be no debate; that the much-touted "courtesy" of the President lies in just about midway of his undertakings, and then perters out at the crucial moment we all know. The President's Hyde-deeds in order to disclose to the country on March 4, 1933, was something fabricated by others and something that his own economic conceptions were limited to a group of folk like the much-contested Hyde-deeds in order to the planting of a hundred mile wide belt of trees across the country and the diffusion of industry as represented by the future Reconstruction Administration; that his first consideration from the beginning of his administration was to get himself and his associates in a position to carry out their plans; that his greatest panic was to get himself re-elected—all these and many more are ready-made reasons why Mr. Roosevelt should and must be defeated. 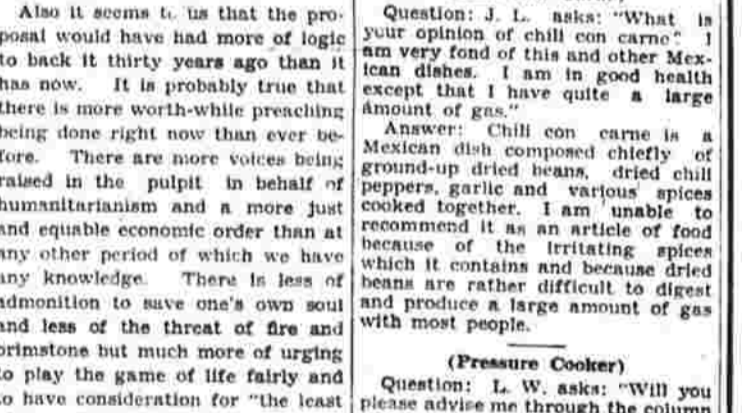

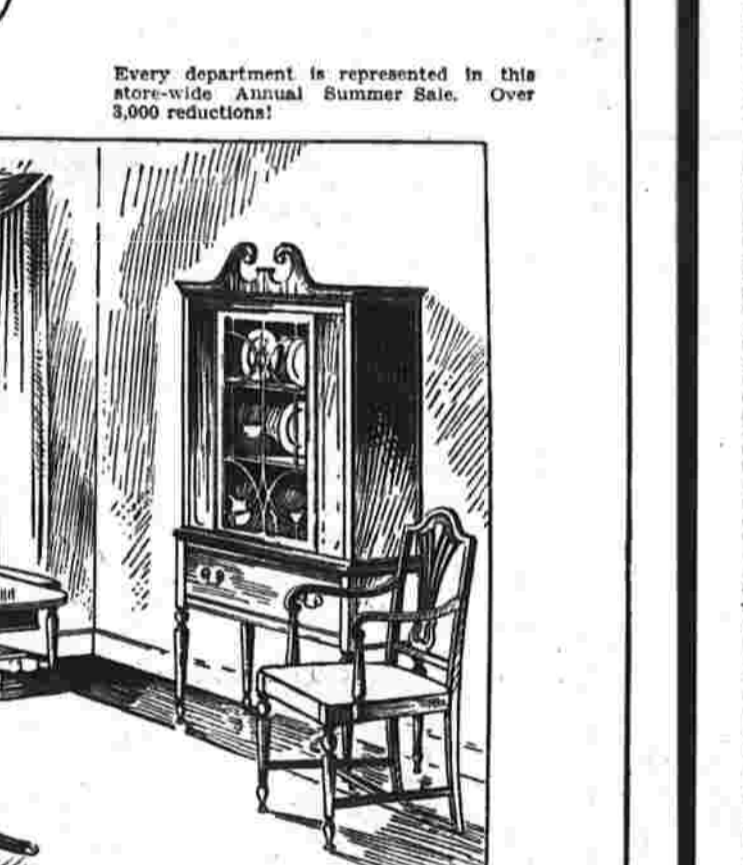

With the close of the municipal fiscal year ending next Saturday dependent on the amount of taxes collected during the remainder of this week, it was expected today that the expenditures for town government would exceed the income by about \$100,000. The deficit last year was \$177,250.

Temporary notes on which the town borrowed money last January, in anticipation of taxes, and amounting to \$400,000, are due this week. Half Wednesday and half Saturday. Town Treasurer George H. Wadwell today made arrangements to issue the \$400,000 due Wednesday. New notes will be used to raise the amount of the deficit.
