Suspension of the 10 C. I. O. unions was anticipated and the heads of those unions took it with a laugh. But a split in the C. I. O. which has had all the breaks so far in its battle with the craft unions, would have been relatively disastrous.

A chance to bust the C. I. O. wide open was exactly what President David Dubinsky of the International Ladies Garment Workers offered the craft union leaders on the council.




