REBEL OFFENSIVE.

Hendaye, France, Aug. 26.—Gen, Emilio Mola's Spanish rebels battered their way toward Irun today in the most furious assault this Franco-Spanish frontier region yet has seen.

By mid-afternoon, however, the attack had falled to achieve its goal. Government forces still were in possession of the really important defenses outside the city.

In the most definite advance, along the Bidassoa river, 2,000 rebel troops smashed their way forward 500 yards before they could be checked.

At least 60 bombs were dropped on Irun, followed by fluttering leaflets, demanding the government surrender or face complete destruction of the town.

Casualties were believed heavy on both sides, and several civilian deaths were reported in Irun.

Legionnaires, Lead.

In the hills back of the city, where the rebels attacked behind an advance guard of 700 Foreign Legionnaires, the desperate government militiamen manned machine guns, huried dynamite grenades and burned their rifles hot with incessant volleys, all to good advantage, tank, six armoved cars and anti-aircraft guns, centered their attack along the Bidovos river while 6,000 legionnaires led advances in the O, araun sector toward the Irun-San Sebastian road.

Two, thousand Loyalist militiamen, blasting roads and throwing up a screen of machine gun fire, thecked the advance on Irun when the rebels still had three miles to go.



Hamilton Works 'Front', Farley Behind the Scenes

The other is the submerged part—the business of organization down in the wards and precincts, the collection of campaign funds and their expenditure the assembling and instruction of party workers.

Very often in the past the presidential nominee has provided the "front," determining policies and taken the cheers and the publicity, while the national chairman has done the real work of practical organization. Sometimes the nominee has taken care of both duties, and the chairman has been a mere figurehead. Neither of these rules






