Spain Investigating Destroyer's Bombing Hartford, Sept. 1 .- (AP) -"Com-

plete assurance" of victory at the Republican state convention here next week is claimed today in the first statement to come out of the headquarters of State's Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn, candidate for governor.






