New York, Sept. 2. (AP)—Marshall Cady, former United States attorney, and Frank W. Adams were commissioned today by Attorney General Homer S. Cummings to investigate and to prosecute four transportation companies for alleged violations of the Neutrality Act of 1935.

The commission was filed in United States District Court here.

The companies to be investigated are the International Mercantile Marine, the Hamburg American Line, the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company and the Porto Rico Express Company.

Cady, it was learned today, is now in South America. Cummings, in a letter accompanying the commission, said the Department of Justice has been informed of the four companies.

(Continued from Page One) other things the construction of thousands of small dams; the removal of submerged lands from commercial production; soil conservation practices, such as reforestation, flood irrigation, long term credit for farmers and crop insurance.

Gov. Landon, presently at Topka, Kan., for his meeting with the President, has been reported by some of the advisors as likely to advocate a federal-state plan of water conservation.

At that time, he urged detailed engineering surveys of every small tributary, looking toward the making of small ponds, reservoirs or creeks, and large lakes when possible.

Speculation already has arisen here over whether the Federal engineering expenditures in the present drought might not be held considerably under those of 1934.

The dry spell of that year began earlier and continued through the summer recess, appropriated \$25,000,000 as a special drought relief fund.

It was allocated as follows: Federal emergency relief administration, \$22,000,000; agricultural relief, \$2,850,000; emergency conservation work, \$300,000; farm credit administration, \$140,780,000; and resettlement administration, \$3,800,000.

The three chief drought relief agencies—the FWA, the Federal Resettlement Administration, and the Federal Emergency Administration—have reported expenditures that are only a fraction of these figures.

The drought committee of the agriculture department has set aside \$50,000,000 for emergency purchase of cattle from drought stricken areas, but only a small part of this has been expended for buying about 3,000 head.

WASHINGTON'S REACTION Washington, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Naval officers said today there was a possibility both the United States and Great Britain would follow the lead of Japan in retaining excessive submarine tonnage scheduled to be scrapped by next January.

This government has not been notified of the Japanese action. It was interpreted here, however, as a formal violation of the treaty's "escalator clause" under which a signatory is entitled to disregard its fleet limitation provisions should the other treaty powers do likewise.

Such action automatically entitles the United States to do likewise. Even if the United States and Great Britain take advantage of late addition, however, statistics show Japan will continue to be superior in actual under-age submarine tonnage.

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SPAIN'S SOCIALISTS PLEAD FOR HELP

Woman Leader in Paris Tries to Get Sympathy for Madrid Government.

Paris, Sept. 2.—(AP)—La Paesolista, Spanish Socialist "Pantheon Flower," opened her campaign today to gain sympathy for the Madrid government in Europe.

Rumors were spread by Rightist quarters that she was attempting to break down Socialist Premier Leon Blum's neutrality stand by urging France to send arms and war planes to aid the Spanish government in its battle against Fascist rebels.

Rightist clamor for her expulsion continued, but La Paesolista asserted she would address a mass meeting tomorrow in behalf of her cause.

The tall, middle-aged Spanish woman, whose real name is Mrs. Dolores Iriburu, announced from

along the Atlantic coast between Capes Bojador and Bissau. It is administered by the government of the Canary Islands, also a Spanish colonial possession.

(The French commentator's assertions follow earlier reports similar territorial promises had been made by General Franco to Premier Mussolini of Italy.)

The Italian promises, it was said, might involve a port in the Balearic Islands or a part of the Spanish North African possessions.)

Rightist sources in Paris reported British groups were discussing plans to bar her from England if she should attempt to go there from France.

At the same time, Leftists prepared for a demonstration Friday in sympathy with the Spanish Socialist government at which Madame Iriburu would likely be an attraction.

Gen. Francisco Franco, leader of the rebel uprising in Spain, has promised to cede Rio de Oro, Spanish West African colony, to Germany in return for Nazi assistance, the newspaper L'Ouvreur asserted.

Genevieve Tabouis, foreign affairs commentator for the newspaper, reported the promise was made by General Franco to Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany.

Such a step would cause a serious problem for France, the commentator added, because Rio de Oro's proximity to French Morocco, an area of approximately 70,000 square miles extends
