

**REBELS DEMAND 'REBELS' YIELD SAN SEBASTIAN**  
Fascists Give Defenders 48 Hours, Then They Will 'Blow City to Pieces'; Anarchists' Control Grows.

San Sebastian, Spain, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Socialist defenders of this "summer embassy" capital, encircled by Fascist infantry and artillery, held firm today in their refusal to surrender. Coldly, they turned down an ultimatum to drop their defenses under a threat from General Emilio Mola, insurgent commander, to "blow the city to pieces."

Internal dissension still raged inside the government lines thrown along the outskirts of the Basque resort which has gained fame as a summer gathering place for foreign diplomats accredited to the Madrid administration.

Looting of shops and stores brought disorder in scattered sections of the city as strong forces of Basque Nationalists sought vainly to preserve order in the face of a prospective enemy attack.

The Basque commanders acknowledged grave fears Anarchists were gaining control of the government militia and the city was in danger of being burned to the ground.

Devastation of the nearby city of Iruya, before its capture by the insurgents who blame Anarchists for the pillage, was held responsible for the Fascist refusal to guarantee general amnesty to the Socialists in return for surrender.

General Mola has insisted those responsible for Iruya's destruction should not escape punishment.

**'LIBERAL' UNIT ORGANIZES, WILL SUPPORT F. D. R.**  
Chicago Parley Turns Into Roosevelt Campaign Factor; Sen. LaFollette at Head of 4-Party Group.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—(AP)—An organization of self-styled liberals from political, labor and agricultural fields today launched a campaign for the re-election of President Roosevelt.

A party of 116 conferees, meeting as the "National Progressive Conference," concluded last night with an agreement to back the chief executive, an appeal for all "progressive-minded" voters to join the drive and expressions of opposition to the Republican Presidential candidacy of Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas.

A telegram was dispatched to Mr. Roosevelt, notifying him of his endorsement and adding: "We are now proceeding to organize in every state in the Union for the purpose of waging a vigorous campaign for your re-election and the furtherance of the fight for equality of opportunity."

Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Progressive, was named chairman of an executive committee of 15 to supervise the group's efforts and send speakers to the hustings. It was decided to establish units in every state, each under the direction of an executive committee of men and women, and to raise a campaign fund. LaFollette said several thousand dollars was contributed to the cause at the session.

LaFollette was authorized to name other members of the executive body. Senator George W. Norris, Nebraska Independent Republican, was chosen honorary president of the committee; Senator Edward F. Costigan, Colorado Democrat, honorary vice-president; Grace Abbott, Chicago woman's leader, honorary vice-chairman; and Frank P. Walsh, head of the New York Power Authority, acting treasurer.

Four Parties Represented  
The official registration roster listed representatives of four political parties: Republican, Democratic, Progressive and Farmer-Labor. There were four U. S. Senators—LaFollette, Black of Alabama, Schweikert of Washington

**'REICH WILL TRIUMPH OVER RUSSIA'—HITLER**  
"If Hour Ever Comes We Will Conquer in Sign of Swastika" Der Fuehrer Tells Youths.

Nurnberg, Sept. 12.—Adolf Hitler, with hundreds of Nazi warplanes roaring in aggressive sweeps overhead, declared today Germany would be overwhelmingly prosperous "if we had" the rich agricultural lands and the ore-laden mountains of Soviet Russia.

Speaking before the Labor Front after he had told thousands of boys and girls that Germany would triumph over Russia "if the hour ever comes," Hitler said: "If I had the Urals, if we possessed Siberia, if we had the Ukraine, National Socialist Germany would be swimming in surplus prosperity."

Nurnberg, Germany, Sept. 12.—Germany will triumph over Russia, Adolf Hitler predicted today, "if the hour ever comes" when soldiers of the two nations face each other across a battlefield.

"Let him carry his Soviet star," the German chancellor told a cheering crowd of 50,000 young Nazis. "We will conquer in the sign of the swastika."

Hitler referred to the black and red swastika emblem of Nazi Germany and the five-pointed red star of Soviet Russia.

**URGES 'SOCIAL ACCOUNTING' AS GUIDE TO POLICY**  
Soule, Economist, Amplifies Idea Touched On by President As He Starts Water's Flow at Boulder Dam.

Washington, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Elaborating on a suggestion made yesterday by President Roosevelt, George Soule, writer on economic subjects, today called for the development of a new system of "social accounting" to guide the nation in its public works and conservation policies.

Such a method for testing the use of natural resources was proposed by the President to 3,000 members of the World Power Conference—among them Cabinet members and distinguished technicians of many nations.

At the close of his brief address they watched him press a button which started the turbines of Boulder Dam, hailed by many delegates as one of the world's most brilliant construction feats.

Word Picture of Result  
A moment later loud-speakers set up in the huge auditorium of Constitution Hall brought the audience a radio description of the double cascade.

**THOUSANDS IN STATE ACCLAIM LANDON AS HE SPEEDS TO MAINE**  
Talks In Four States On Landon's Schedule

Aboard Landon Train Enroute to Maine, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon pressed his surprise foray into New England today with a strenuous schedule of three-minute speeches in four states.

His unexpected personal drive for New England's 41 presidential electoral votes will be climaxed tonight by a radio address closing the Republican campaign in Maine, two days before the closely watched "weather vane" election in that state.

The Republican candidate reiterated a pledge of a "fighting campaign for good government," as he swung eastward declaring at Fort Wayne: "I don't blame this present administration for trying to hide behind a non-political campaign plea. I would too if I had to defend such a record as they have made in Washington in the last three years."

In addition to Fort Wayne, he spoke at Gary, Valparaiso, Plymouth and Warsaw.

Enroute Landon conferred with Republican leaders including Dr. C. L. Glenn Saxton, head of the national committee's research department, and Gifford Pinchot, former governor of Pennsylvania.

Ten talks from the rear platform of his special train were scheduled in Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Maine, a stop at Haverhill, Mass., being substituted for one at Sterling Junction in a last minute overnight change.

Cheered yesterday by crowds at five Indiana stops, the Republican candidate reiterated a pledge of "a fighting campaign for good government," and repeatedly stressed, "we want a government that will be just and honest, that will protect the average man in his economic rights and his opportunities; and also a government that will not take too much out of his pocketbook."

**ITALY INCREASES FUNDS FOR WAR**  
Also Raises Salaries of 650,000 Government Employees; Il Duce's Statement.

Rome, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Italy's Cabinet, under the presiding eye of Benito Mussolini, today voted extraordinary appropriations for land, sea and air forces "to proportion our military preparations to the necessities of the international situation."

The ministers also approved salary increases, averaging 8 per cent, for 650,000 government employees and added to the wages of many thousands of provincial and municipal workers.

Il Duce told the council that Italy's campaign for self-sufficiency in raw materials, especially those used for military purposes, has "already given a noteworthy result and will be continued most vigorously."

The general commission for war manufactures, he told the ministers, now controls more than 1,000 auxiliary manufacturing plants.

**JAPANESE DESIRE NEW NAVAL PACTS**  
Admiral Expresses Confidence That Peace Will Be Kept in Pacific.

Tokyo, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Japanese desire for new naval treaties, based on parity with Great Britain and the United States, was hinted today by Admiral Osumi Nagano, minister of the navy.

Admiral Nagano, in an exclusive interview, expressed confidence peace will continue in the Pacific with expiration of the London and Washington pacts next January.

He declared Japanese intent to inaugurate a naval building race with the United States and Great Britain after termination of the treaties.

"I see no reason to fear that the prospects of continued peace in the Pacific should be darkened by the termination of the treaties a few months hence," the Cabinet minister asserted.

**JOHN N. LEIGHTON COMMITS SUICIDE**  
Prominent New York Clubman Hangs Himself; His Bride Discovers Body.

New York, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The body of John Leighton Leighton, 39, socially prominent clubman, was found hanging early today from a bathroom clothes hook in a hotel by his wife, Mrs. Leighton, who had entered from an adjoining bedroom.

Mrs. Leighton pushed at the door when her husband failed to answer her call, and when she discovered his body her screams brought a hotel employe to her assistance. A belt was fastened about Leighton's neck.

**SPURN HANDOUTS' COUGHLIN ASSERTS**  
Radio Priest Continues His Demands for \$1,800 Minimum in Wages.

New York, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin turned to a resumption of his National broadcast today after asking a New York through not to be satisfied with what he termed an insulting New Deal "handout."

Speaking last night at Ebbets Field, the Detroit priest appealed for the payment of "a living annual wage" by the mass production industries, to consist of "an \$1,800 minimum for a father who has a wife and three children."

"We have won the war over want," he said. "The problem of production has been solved. What a crime that there still exists want in the midst of plenty."

Added by modern machinery, he said, present day workers produce 100 times as much as their ancestors in a given period of time.

**BURNED TO DEATH IN AUTO ACCIDENT**  
Greenwich Broker, While Conscious, Directed the Efforts of Rescuers.

Greenwich, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Allen R. Sushers, 31, Greenwich stock broker, was burned to death today in an automobile accident in which two others were injured.

His automobile capsized and burst into flames after a collision with a car driven by a youth booked at police headquarters as Alexander Johnson, 18, of Stuyvesant avenue, S. N. Y.

Sushers, conscious for a time, directed efforts of rescuers to extricate him from the flaming wreckage. He was dead when taken out.

Two of Sushers' companions, William Collins, 30 and Hyde Phillips, 28, were injured.

**SEXTUPLE SLAYER GOES TO GALLOWS**  
Execution Delayed for Day So Mother Could Make Plea to Governor.

Walla Walla, Wash., Sept. 12.—(AP)—His last words in the death chamber a plea for another convict, Leo Hall, former seminary student, was hanged last night—and today the work "executed" on his prison record wrote the final chapter of the Erlands Point sextuple-murder case.

The death which his frantic mother, appealing to the governor by plea, had delayed for a day was pronounced over the 34-year-old Hall's limp body at 11:16 p. m. Pacific standard time. (2:16 a. m. a. l.)

Salt Lake City, Sept. 12.—(AP)—"Muckleheads" of the hunt—those sporting amateurs who roam the wilds at hunting time and shoot on sight—are going to learn "manners" or get out of the woods, western sportsmen vowed today.

**LITTLE ENTENTE MEETS AT PARLEY**  
Europe's Balance of Power Again Becomes Vital Issue at Conference.

Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Europe's delicate balance of power becomes a vital issue again today as statesmen of the Little Entente gathered around conference tables.

The meeting was regarded as one of the most important in the history of the Little Entente, composed of Yugoslavia, Rumania, and Czechoslovakia.

Delegates sought to find an answer to this question: "Shall southeastern Europe follow the military, economic and political policies of Russia, France, Germany or Poland?"

The absence of former Foreign Minister Nicholas Titulescu of Rumania from the session was regarded as a warning for the Germans. Titulescu was deposed from his post in a governmental reorganization which observers interpreted as leading to a closer association between Rumania and Germany.

**ARREST TWO MORE IN VICE CLEANUP**  
Federal Agents Nab 42nd Person in New England Drive.

New York, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Federal agents broadened the scope of their energetic drive against prostitution in the northeastern states today, with the 42nd arrest in Connecticut and the quizzing of nine persons in Springfield, Mass.

Two of those taken into custody in Springfield were charged with violation of the Man White Slave law.

Talbotville Pastor to Conclude Long Service Sunday—Resigned Last Week.

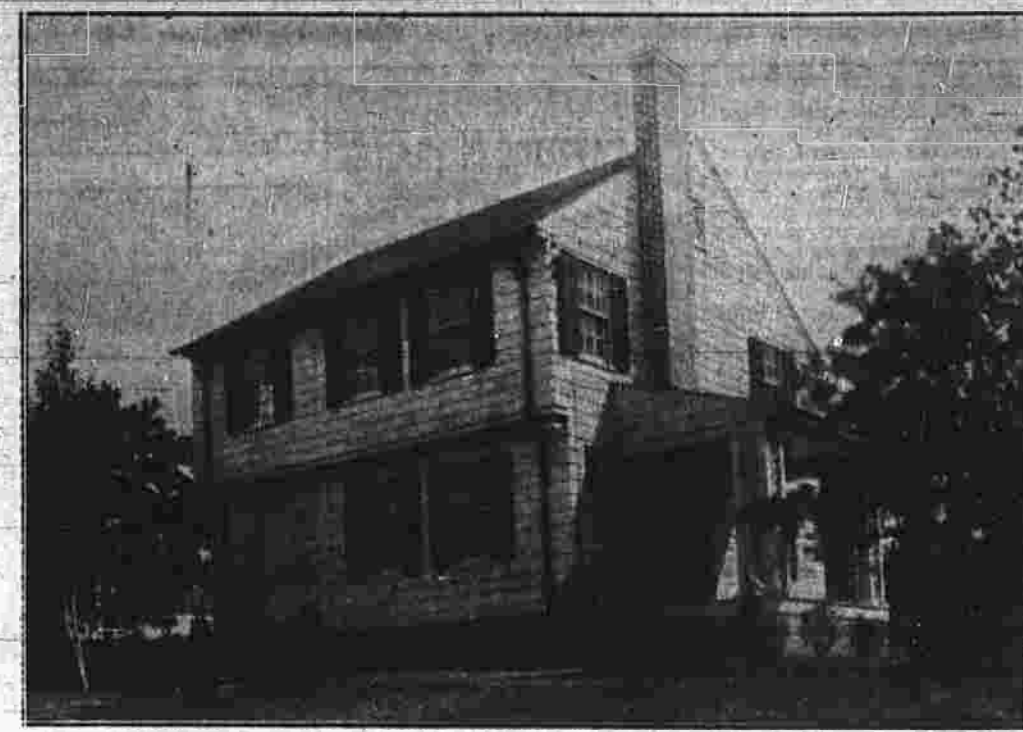

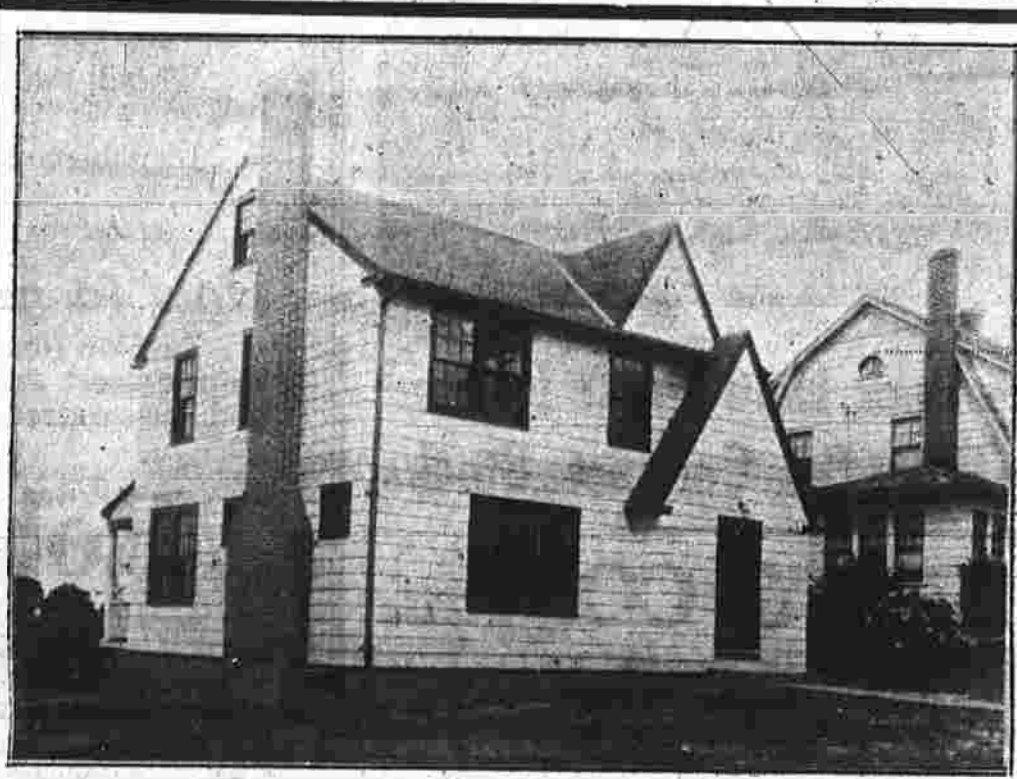

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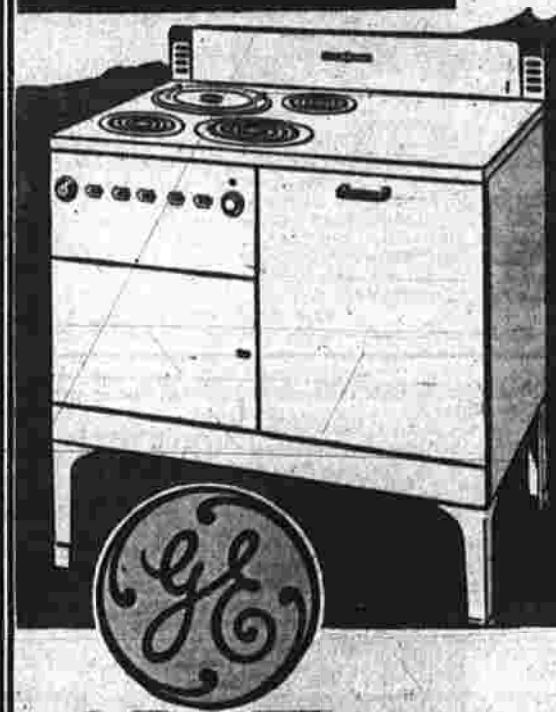
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
