Curiously enough, when biliousness is present, it is more often a sign that something is wrong in the intestinal tract, than that the liver is at fault. Over-eating of all kinds of rich, heavy food by a patient already constipated is one of the fundamental causes of intestinal fermentation which will, in turn, produce biliousness.

Most cases of biliousness are readily cured by the removal of the causes of this intestinal fermentation and putrefaction. The bile is composed largely of wastes and toxins which have been absorbed from the alimentary canal. When an extra amount of bile is manufactured this shows that the intestines have been over-loaded with certain kinds of food. The liver is not then able to take care of the extra burden placed upon it and so becomes out of order. The patient becomes billous and will say that he feels nauseated. One in this condition is literally being made sick by bile, which, in the right quantity, is very necessary to good digestion.

Although "billousness" is not recognized as a disease by medical textbooks, many patients still continue to go on having attacks which they describe as due to billiousness. However, the usual billous attack must be considered a symptom and not a disease. As I know that billiousness is a fairly common trouble, and since my readers will know what is meant when I use this term, today's article will be on billiousness.

Common symptoms arising during the billious attack are: the presence of a thick, furry covering on the tongue, black spots before the eyes, dizniness, bilming headache, lack of appetite, weakness, blurred vision, a depressed or "blue" state of mind, sailowness of the skin, nausea, and sometimes, tenderness over the liver area on the right side. Of these 145 were straight Democratic, 205 straight Republican. Five were mutilated and consequently rejected. The rest were splits. All Republican candidates were of course elected. Claude the Lorest Democratic candidate for dates were of course elected. Claude W. Jones, Democratic candidate for First Selectman, ran well ahead of his ticket, coming within 40 votes of election: The ticket elected reads as follows: Assessor, Winthrop S. Porter; Board of Relief, J. Banks Jones; First Selectman, Edmund H. Horton; Second, Winthrop S. Porter; Third, Claude W. Jones; Auditors, Clarkson F. Bailey and Charles E. Hilding; Registrar of Voters, Carlton B. Jones (d) and John N. Hewitt (r); Board of Education, Natalle B. Jones, Mildred Fillimore, Ethel Hilding. All grand jurors and constables of either party were elected. The license question received a good sized vote, 185 voting for no license, 73 for a beer permit, and 62 for an all alcoholic liquor

It was also voted to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the state highway commissioner for the construction of the unfinished section of North Street road to the Boiton line. There is about a mile of this road to be Street road to the Bolton line. There is about a mile of this road to be completed, which is known as the "missing link", and has caused much criticism. The cost as a whole, it is estimated, will be about \$35,000. It will be a state aid road, and the town will be called upon to bear only one eighth of the expense, and the state will assume the maintenance of the road. This is a very satisfactory settlement of this question, as the town will not have to bond itself to pay expenses, as call-

intisfactory settlement of this question, as the town will not have to bend itself to pay expenses, as called for in one proposition for the completion of this road.

The question of electric lights for Gliead street was decided in the affirmative. Five lights will be provided between Gliead Corner and the John L. Way place. It was also voted to confer with the Selectmen of Colchester in the establishment of the boundary line between the two towns. Uncertainty as to just where this line should run has caused frouble for some time. Stephen Zagray's farm is cut in two by the boundary, and how much he owes in taxes to Colchester or Hebron is such a problem that he has not paid either for the past few years, and declares he shall not until the survey is made.
