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ALSACE-LORRAINE PASSES THE CRISIS

Only 12,000 Out of Two Millions Attend Rallies of the Communists in Area.

Paris, Oct. 12.—(AP)—French Communists' propaganda tour of Alsace-Lorraine ended quietly, announced today the Left party in the region for 122 meetings in the past few days.

Rightists ridiculed the Communist rally, asserting the "mobilization of the masses" brought only 12,000 of two million propaganda meetings in a region of 2,000,000 people.

The striking thing is the enormous expense, trouble, discredit and loss of time these Moslems' rallies imposed upon France to obtain their pitiful results, commented sarcastically the newspaper Le Matin.
