Payroll Deductions to

Washington.

The deduction from employees' pay, which is referred to as an income tax, from which no exemption is allowable, increases to 1½%, then 2%; then 2% and finally 3%.

Salary deductions are made on pay up to \$3,000 a year, or \$57.89 per week.

Employees exempted from the tax Employees exempted from the tax and benefits include farm workers, domestic servants, casual labor, members of the crew of a ship, Federal, state and municipal employees and employees of educational, religious or eleemosynary institutions.

Old-age benefits under the law, however, cannot be paid until you reach 65 years of age, provided you then guit your job; and in no case

then quit your job; and in no case before 1942. Before the end of 1937 you will

Tokyo, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Despondent Japanese lovers—2,452 in the last four years—leaped to death in seething volcanic lava, an official survey showed today.

In 517 cases, the suicides were double—the lover and his beloved plunging into the bubbling mass hand in hand.

An alarming increase in youthful self-inflicted death was cited by the suicide statistics with 7,598 fatalities in Tokyo alone. Of the total, 2,416 were young men and women between the ages of 16 and 20.

Out of 15,633 other suicides, 63 per cent were men. Their motives were shown as escape from pain and unrequited or lost love.






