





Public Health Nurses from the State Department of Health are organizing the clubs with the aid of the local public health nurses in the various towns.

The subjects discussed relate to health and hygiene of prospectements. The nurse opens the meeting with a short talk and directs discussion of questions pertinent to health. Mothers enter freely into these discussion. Advice in regard to clothing for the mother is given with reference to her comfort and safety. In the meeting room is a display of clothing for the newborn baby. This display is to show simple, comfortable, and not too expensive clothing and other equipment for the new baby. The mothers are invited to bring their small children who are cared for in another room during the mothers' meeting.
