charitable and similar purposes, but an excluded employer may, by electing to pay the tax under the new law, be covered.

This bill does not apply at all to several types of employment, chief among which are: (1) Agricultural labor, (2) Domestic service in a private home, (3) Government service, including employment by the state and its political subdivisions, (4) Employment of a minor child by his parent, or of a parent by his son or daughter.

On or before January 24, 1937, all employers subject to tax under Title IX of the Social Security Act (employees) must pay to the Commissioner of Labor a contribution equal to 1.5 percent of the total wages paid to employees in 1936.

Beginning in 1937, employers of employees who are subject to the plan must contribute 1 percent of their wages, but not more than \$100 per year.

Employees must contribute 0.5 percent of their wages, but not more than \$5 per year. The total contribution for each employee will be 1.5 percent of the total wages paid to the employee in 1936.
