Sweeping majorities, unparalleled in this state which for years had been regarded as impregnable Republican stronghold, placed Connecticut's presidential electors in the Democratic column today for the first time since 1912 and returned Gov. Wilbur L. Cross to office for a fourth successive term.

The state which he lost to President Hoover four years ago by 6, 788 gave President Rocsevelt its eight electoral votes by an unofficial majority of more than 100,000 in yesterday's election. Almost disimpressive was the victory scored by the 74-year-old governor, retired dean of the Yale Graduate school, and the rest of the Denocratic state slate.

For the first time in its history, Connecticut elected also an all-Democratic delegation to the National House of Representatives to join the state's two Democratic Senators in Congress.

Only President Coolidge, who in 1924 carried the state by 136,133 exceeded President Rocsevel's majority. President Wilsoq won in 1912 by 8,237 votes.
