

The state sets its own standards of the degree of need, age and the like, subject to a few federal limitations.

Aid to the needy blind is measured by approximately the same considerations. To illustrate, consider a home where the breadwinner has died, leaving the widow to take care of a blind grandfather and three children under ten.

If they reside in a state co-operating with all three plans, the local authorities may make a monthly allowance for the grandfather and each child as needed. The grandfather can rot collect twice, for being aged and blind. If the widow is blind, she is eligible.

The Federal grants for aid to children are one-third of the state expenditures for that purpose, except no contribution is made for that part which exceeds \$18 a month for the first child and \$12 for each additional child in the same family. Payments for children in institutions may not be supplemented with the cash from Washington.

To be helped, the dependent child must be living with relatives. He can not be excuded from the benefits if he has lived in the state for a year preceding the application or was born within the year, providing the mother has lived in the state for a year preceding the birth.

The raising or state funds is left entirely to the state. Each state plan must be effective all over the state, and must be mandatory upon the local units if administered by them. NEW SOCIAL SECURITY LAW Federal Old-Age Benefits That Are Payable Be-

5. ginning January 2, 1937. Two types of Federal old age benefits are payable beginning on January 2, 1927—http:// sum payments and payments in the event of death. Payment of the third type—Federal old age monthly retirement benefits—will not begin until January 1, 1942.

monthly retirement benefits—will not begin until January 1, 1942.

Lump sum payments will be made to those individuals who do not qualify for monthly benefits because their total wages from covered employments after 1936 and before the age of 65 are less than \$2,000, or because they have not carned wages in covered employments for at least one day in each of five different calcular years after 1936 and before the age of 65.

Either of these ceasons disqualifies an individual for monthly benefits. However, he will be paid in a single lump sum an amount equal to 3½ per cent of his total wages from covered employments after 1936 and before the age of 65. For instance, if an individual's wages total \$1500, he would receive a single lump sum payment of \$63.

Death payments will be made to the estates of those workers who die after 1936 and before they attain the age of 65. Payments will be based on total wages earned in covered employments after 1936. The amount in each case will equal 3½ per cent of the individual's total wages.

As an example, if a worker's wages after 1936 total \$6000, his estate will get 3½ per cent of this sum, or \$210.

Both lump sum and death payments also will be made after monthly benefits become payable on January 1, 1942. If a worker qualifies for and receives a monthly benefit, but dies before receiving in monthly benefits an amount which equals 3½ per cent of his total wages, his estate will be paid the difference between total benefit he received and 3½ per cent of total wages.


