

4. Where the Money to Pay the Benefits Comes

The wage records of the estimated 25,000,000 employees for whom Federal old-age benefits begin to accrue on January 1, 1937, will be maintained from information returns, or wage reports, submitted periodically by employers.

The information returns are required under Treasury regulation 91, made public recently by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

The first information return will be for the six-month period ending June 30, 1937, and it is required that it be filed at the offices of a collector of internal revenue not later than July 31, 1937. Thereafter, these information returns are required quarterly.

In addition, the Treasury regulations require employers to file an information return with respect to each employee who attains the age of 65 or who dies before attaining the age of 65.

Both of these reports must be filed not later than 15 days after the employee attains the age of 65 or after death.

The information contained in the wage reports will be used by the records division of the bureau of Federal old-age benefits, Social Security Board, in giving each eligible employee his proper wage credit for the period for which the return is made.

The system of making this entry on the ledger account of each employee will be almost entirely mechanical.

NEW SOCIAL SECURITY LAW

The Social Security Act sets up in the Treasury of the United States an "old age reserve account." The secretary of the Treasury has the responsibility of estimating the amount of annual appropriations required for the account, of investing and liquidating the funds, and of reporting annually on the actuarial status of the account.

Congress is authorized to appropriate for each fiscal year, beginning with the fiscal year ending June 30, 1937, an amount sufficient as an annual premium to provide for the payments required for Federal old age benefits.

The secretary of the Treasury submits annually to the Bureau of the Budget an estimate of the appropriations to be made to the old age reserve account.

Recognizing that the Federal old age benefits would impose an additional expense on the Treasury, Congress set up in the Social Security Act certain new taxes, which are to be covered into the general revenue fund of the Treasury.

These taxes are an income tax on employees engaged in certain occupations and an excise tax on employeers who have in their employ persons engaged in certain occupations. The rate on employeer and employee is identical.

Beginning on January 1, 1937, the employers' tax and the employeers tax is 1 per cent on the payroll of the former and 1 per cent on the wages of the latter.

This rate applies for the next three years, when it increases by ½ of 1 per cent, and increases by the same amount thereafter for each three-year period until 1949, when the tax on the employer and employee reaches 3 per cent for each.



Washington—Anyone listening to arguments in the supreme court these days would be thoroughly justified in suspecting he had drifted into the wrong chamber and actually was hearing a senate debate, minus the senate interruptions, of course.

Traditionally, courts are concerned with the law. In turn, you might expect congress and the rhief executive to decide what is "good" or "wise" for the country and leave the supreme court simply to determine whether congress and the President were acting within the constitution.




