





"The value of the service being rendered by a number of the alms-houses needs to be carefully weighed", said Dr. Chakerian who is

weighed", said Dr. Chakerian who is Assistant Professor of Sociology at Connecticut College. Take, for. example, almshouse No. 7 owned by the town and comprising about 150 acres of land. It is located in an isolated area towards the center of the state. The building is a two-story, wooden structure in fair repair, lighted by kerosene lamps and inadequately heated by stoves. Furnishings are meager. Fire protection is non-existent. In spite of the fact that there are 10 or less inmates, they do their own cooking and clean their own quarters.

The inmates occupy single rooms. Some sleep on the first floor in rooms opening out of the kitchen or sitting room. Others have rooms on the second floor. There are two registers set in the floor to allow heat to rise from the first floor stoves onto the second floor.

Old age and low mentality are the immates. Two old means the second for the second floor. ng with the stoves, are locked their rooms, one on the first and the other on the second floor, during the evenings and nights.
At the time the visitors were

specting the almshouses, one of the town officials was there and the question of locking the two men in their rooms was discussed. It was pointed out that there might be great difficulty in releasing them in case of fire. The official's answer was "well, I don't know. I have to tie my dog at night so that I may find him in the morning, don't I? Why not lock in these men?" When he was told that the men happened to be human beings and he a public official charged with the duty of caring for the poor, he smiled, shrugged his shoulders, and said, "Well, maybe you're right."

Almshouse No. 20, located in a Connecticut city, has at least five bed cases who are in great need of nursing and medical care. They are chronic sick individuals who should be in an infirmary and not in an almshouse which has no nurses on its staff and provides poor medical service. One of the cases was being changed twice a day by the matron, yet when the visitors opened the door of the room the dors that emanated were so revolting that the making of a hasty retreat became necessary.

In this same almshouse was received some months ago a cancer patient discharged by one of the general hospitals as a chronic case. A few days after her arrival there suddenly opened on her back a large hole "through which you could push your fist", according to the matron. Needless to say, that shortly after the patient parsed away. There being ito state infirmary, almshouses at present seem to be the only public institutions to which chronic sick or fivalid cases can be sent.

In still another almshouse, No. 5, continued Dr. Chakerlan, was found a middle-aged state pauper who lived for years in a shack fust across from the mum building. He was mentally and physically, as well as socially, a difficult case. He refused to sat the food prepared by the matron and insisted on preparing his own meals. The shack was filthy and in a messy condition as he did not allow the town physically as did not allow the town physical to lock it over, but treated it himself, with
