





LEGION TO ENTERTAIN

Results Are Good.

During 11 years and eight months aso civil suits have been brought in the Manchester Town Court, it was learned today from the files of the court.

Last year 87 setions were brought in the court. Already in 1937 four actions have been started.

The civil side of the court, which is set up to fill, to a large extent, any need for a small-claims court, is familiar to only a few persons in town. Many who might have recourse to it have little or no knowledge of the court's function other than for hearing criminal cases.

Many Settlements

Only a small proportio of the cases brought in the court ever come to trial, settlements being effected and judgments entered without following the procedure to its ultimate end in the court room.

The cost of obtaining judgments in the Town Court are small. Its costs one dollar to initiate action and two dollars more if a judgment

average time necessary is about two weeks.

The special act of the General Assembly which established the police court became effective in July, 1895. Civil jurisdiction was added during March, 1925.

No appeal from the local court is permitted in civil cases the judgment in which is less than \$50. Verdicts for larger sums may be appealed to the Common Pleas Court in Hartford.

The local court has jurisdiction up to \$200 in civil cases. Cases involving sums between \$150 and \$200 may be brought in either the local court or the Common Pleas Court.


