

We should emphasize the fact that the change is very slow. It usually takes two years to make very much progress.

If quick results are desired, more expensive methods are necessary, such as plowing, fertilizing and reseeding.

The lime and superphosphate treatment has the advantage of being one of the cheapest types of pasture improvement particularly when we figure the cost over the period of years for which the benefits will be received. Tests have shown that the effect of putting a ton of limestone on an acre of pasture will last for eight or even ten years. Tests have esto shown that 500 pounds of superphosphate, when applied to an acre of pasture, will be sufficient for four or five years.

When figured in this manner, the annual charge for materials should not exceed \$2.00 an acre per year.


