Rome, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The possibility of a far-reaching accord to guarantee European territorial integrity, was reported today in informed Fascist circles, following the conferences between Premier Mussolini and Hermann Goering, Nasi air minister. The pact is considered a forerunner to Germany's return to the Lesque of Nations.

Goering left for Naples this morning to pay his respects to Crown Prince Humbert, after renewed demonstrations of Italo-German cordiality. While Goering was enroute to Naples, German Ambasandor Ulrich von Hassel left by train for Berlin to report the results of the conversations personally to Chancellor Hilter.

The minortance of these results was indicated by Von Hassel's making the trip himself rather than entry sting them to telegraphic code.

At the same time Sir Eric Drummond, the British Ambasador, left for London after confering with Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Clano.
