

New York, Jan. 26.—(AP) —Dr. There is no close means, Dr. Elizames H. Kimball, United States meteorlogist noted as the weather advisor for trans-Atlantic friers, explained today the differences in the recording of river stages in flooded cities and how these stages are computed.

"On all navigible rivers", he related, "there are gauges with scales of measures. Zero is the lowest water stage ever observed at a particular point on the river.

"Along the river, there are constant variations in the river depth at this lowest stage. This is due, of course, to the differences in terrain. In an area of wide and low valleys, the zero point on the gauge is consequently much lower than at a point in the river where the banks are close together and steep.

"This zero point is always at the lowest point recorded, not a low average. The river stages are measured from this point."


