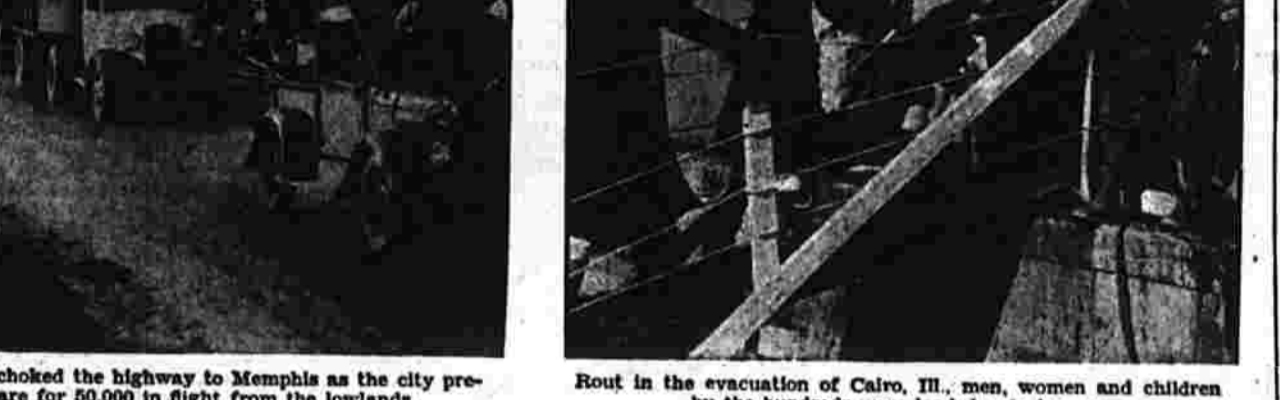

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# WAR ALONG THE WESTERN FRONT



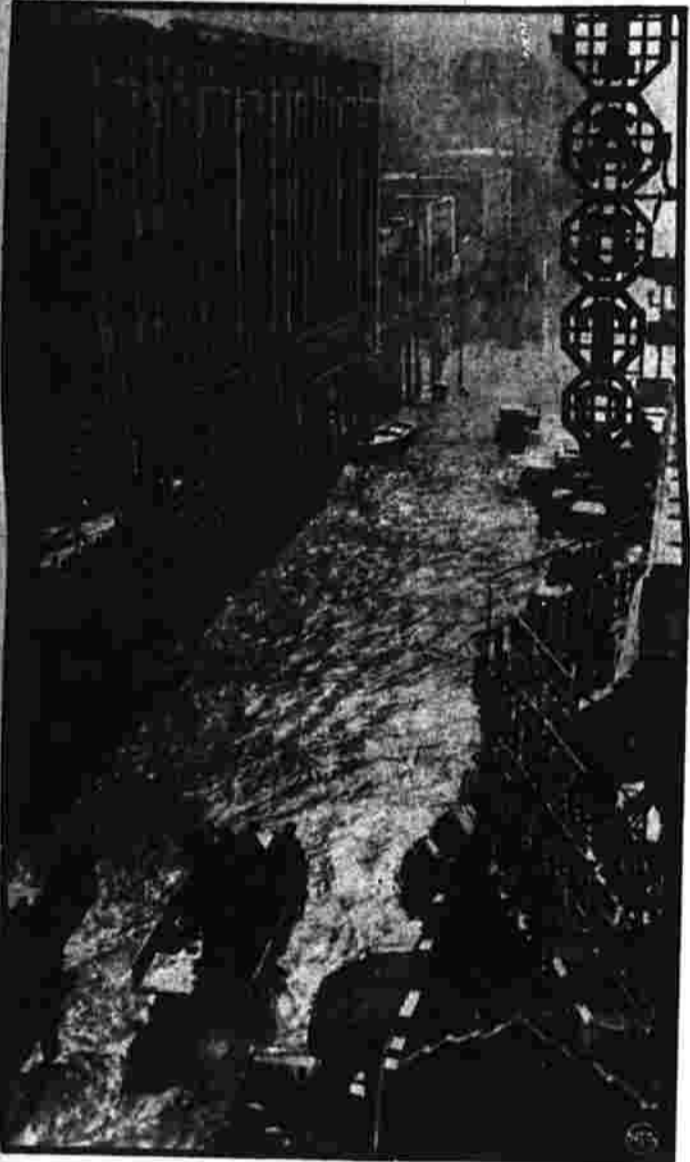

powers and duties except those relating to gasoline tax administration.

4. Abolish the department of aeronautics and transfer its powers and duties to the Department of Public Safety.

5. Advisory Board and authorize Commissioner of Public Safety to establish, as needed, technical advisory committees to assist the commission in formulating rules and regulations for aeronautics.

6. Abolish the office of athletic commissioner, including local inspectors and transfer its powers and duties to the Department of Public Safety.

7. Continue the Liquor Control Commission as a division of the Department of Public Safety to promulgate rules and regulations under the Liquor Control Act and to grant, suspend and revoke liquor permits.

8. Transfer the clerical and enforcement duties of the liquor commission to the Commissioner of Public Safety.

9. Abolish the state traffic commission and transfer its powers and duties to the Commissioner of Public Safety.

10. Transfer to the Department of Public Safety the powers and duties of the Public Utilities Commission to regulate and inspect the construction and equipment of public service motor vehicles and trucks.

CRIME FILE ON BOLITHO BLANE

BOLITHO BLANE, British American, disappears from yacht owned by his prospective bride, CAPTAIN ROCKEVAUGE, of Miami. A note found in Blane's cabin addressed to his secretary NICHOLAS STODART, indicates undue since for some days past Blane was not seen by Stodart whose Blane's company since AUGUST 27, 1936, at a new hotel that day.

Other passengers aboard the yacht, CAPTAIN ROCKEVAUGE, ROCKEVAUGE, Mrs. WELLES, REGINALD JOCELYN, Mrs. JOCELYN, Lady Welles's daughter and son-in-law; the BISHOP of CUBA; COUNT LEIGH FUSCO, and ENOCH S. STODART, were seen at Miami for investigation. Stodart and Blane, a cabin steward, Stodart suggests a clear case of suicide.

CHAPTER III

DETECTIVE OFFICER KETTERING'S REPORT, CONTINUED

Having taken statements from Captain Derrington, Mr. RockeVAUGE, Mr. Stodart and the cabin steward, Ringtrott, I then proceeded to Suite C which had been allotted to Bolitho Blane. It consisted of a drawing room, a bedroom and private bathroom. On the other side of the drawing room there was a stateroom, which I am told, had been allotted to Stodart in order that he might be near his employer.

A cursory examination of the suite showed nothing which would be of special remark. Captain Derrington told me that he had locked up at 8:45 before ordering the ship back to Miami, so that nothing is to be seen or reported as to what happened after that time. The only person seen on board since that time was the steward, Ringtrott, discovered Blane to be missing. I instructed Station Photographer Southward to take photographs of the suite and decided to postpone a detailed examination until morning soon after arriving on board I told Police Surgeon Judd that my case was that of a "man overboard," his presence was no longer required.

At 12:30 Station Photographer Southward had completed his work upon which he had Suite C unlocked and placed Officer Gordon on guard outside it. After which I went aboard in the morning, soon after arriving on board I told Police Surgeon Judd that my case was that of a "man overboard," his presence was no longer required.

Prints of the photographs taken by Southward have just come to hand and are attached herewith. In print B, you will note the parallel lines across, and in my view, a curve from the table to the porthole in the drawing room. Please make a close examination of these at once.

If, after examination of Blane's suite, you are satisfied that no circumstances point to his death having been framed you can give the contents of the yacht a close bill, but the Captain, RockeVAUGE, Stodart and the steward, Ringtrott, should be warned that they will be required to give evidence at the inquest.

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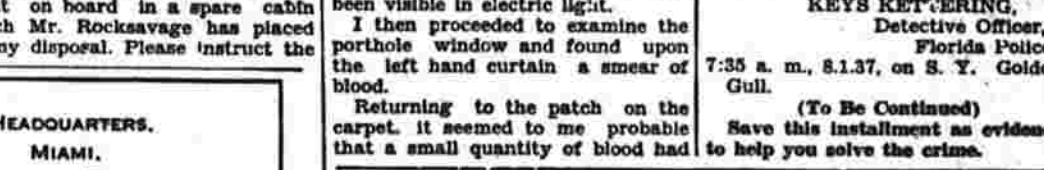

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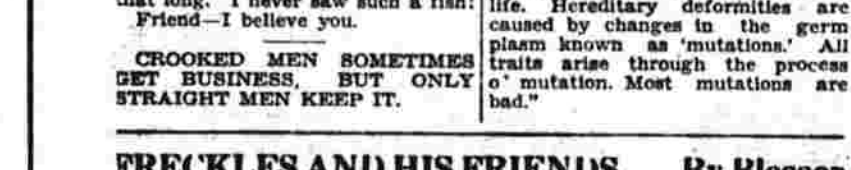
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
