15,000 ITALIANS IN NET OF ARMS ABOUT MALAGA Rebels Report City Is Under Reign of Terror by Anarchists and Communists As Fascists Draw Lines Tight

With the Fascists on the outskirts of Malaga, Spain, (2:30 a. m. Spanish time, delayed in transmission), Feb. 5.-(AP)—A thousand armed Anarchists and Communists worked Malaga today, refugees reported, as they tried to break through the Fascist lines on the city proper.

Two hours after midnight the Malaga front was a semi-circle with both ends open to the sea and a radius of less than two miles.

The Italian Fascist garrison at Malaga reported to Rome that Fascist troops were in the city's streets at 1 p. m. local time—8 a. m. in Rome.

All sides of Malaga were blocked off long before dawn by the Fascist columns, a modern, united army of Spanish regulars, Foreign Legionnaires, Fascist volunteers and Carlists.

Almost 800 Republican soldiers, with almost no resistance, along the coast to the docks of the port. Through the night, the anarchist forces and several hundred gendarmes played on the shoreline to kill any stragglers of the government defenders to escape by sea.

DEADLOCK STILL ON AS STRIKE DISPUTE CONTINUES TO RAGE Over 3,000 Soldiers Are Ready at Flint

Flint, Mich., Feb. 5.-(AP)—Military authorities, dividing attention between events at home and the deadlocked General Motors peace party at Detroit, held more than 3,000 troops in readiness today in this strike-harassed city.

Official silence cloaked their plans but more than two-thirds of the Michigan National Guard strength was billeted in nine sections of Flint as reports filtered through that the settlement conference appeared near a crisis.

Three contingents were evident if the party failed or was recessed: Martial law; help for Sheriff Thomas Wolcott in ejecting "stay-behind" troops, or extension of the present military blockade to include all General Motors plants.

One union official disclosed that 1,000 strikers out of 1,500 were ill but remained in the city to support the union as the settlement conference appeared near a crisis.

A union representative said that had been shut in No. 4 plant and the electric heaters were to be taken into the building.

"NINE OLD MEN" BECOME CENTER OF COURT FIGHT

Washington, Feb. 5.-(AP)—The Supreme Court today was divided 5-4 in upholding the constitutionality of the National Labor Relations Act, a decision that has become a center of court fight.

The court's decision, which was announced in a unanimous opinion written by Chief Justice Charles E. Hughes, was a 5-4 vote.

The dissenting opinion was written by Justice Brandeis, who was joined by Justices Sutherland, Roberts, and Stone.

The majority opinion, written by Chief Justice Hughes, held that the National Labor Relations Act was a valid exercise of Congress's power under the Commerce Clause of the Constitution.
