New York, Feb. 15.—(AP)—In a preparedness plea for the United States, Senator Charles McNary of Oregon today declared that if there is another big military explosion, no matter where, the danger is generated world-wide.

General Harbord declared that America's hope of remaining aloof from any European conflict by clinging to a policy of neutrality is a policy that is being abandoned.

"The difficulties of a neutral position for the United States in event of an important war are well known," he said, "and it is a policy that is being abandoned."

"Our ships sail every day. Our country is a trading nation. We have over seven billions of dollars in American goods and services in foreign lands."
