



Supreme Court Side Glances

Louis Dembits Brandeis

Quiet, sensitive, and ascetic, Louis Dembitz Bran-dels is a leader of the progressive wing of the Supreme Court. He was born in Louisville, Ky, in 1885, and is now at 81 the oldest member of the

He made his career as a lawyer in Boston, and as soon as he became prosperous he began to devote his talents to public causes, including important public utility cases.

When President Wilson named Brandels to the Supreme Court in 1916 there was a bitter-fight against his confirmation by those who considered him "a dangerous radical." He became the court's leading liberal exponent when Justice Holmes died.

Brandels has been generally favorable to New Deal legislation, voting favorably in 10 critical cases, unfavorably in six. He is passionately devoted to the ancient ideals of personal freedom, and is an opponent of the concentration of either economic or political power.

Brandeis's knowledge of law is profound, and he is never refuted in questions of fact or law. He lives in the utmost simplicity, with social affairs as such completely barred.

The Zionist movement and a long list of social causes have won his support from time to time. Not the least of his services has been in his influence over young men. He has never ceased to be a teacher of promising youngsters, in whom he is invariably interested. His decisions are lucid, clear, and revealing of the philosopher beneath the black robe.
