

This inventory is in the form of the annual statistics on the mortality and incidence for the vari-

nerable points at which the drives of the public health machinery must be aimed. Past records show, for example, that in this month of March, the mortality from pneumonia is about at its peak. Moreover, Mr. Welling said, hospital records of pneumonia cases show that 70 percent, at least, of the pneumonias (there are some 30 types) have resulted from the neglected cold. Last year in Connecticut 1,217 persons died c this disease, the death rate having been 69.7 per 100,000 population or slightly greater than the average rate over the years 1932-1936. Reminding that there is a definite serum for five types of pneumonia, Mr. Welling urged the calling of a physician in case of a neglected cold, since pneumonia will tolerate no neglect or delay and the serum must be given at the earliest possible moment.

Early spring sown clover and alfalfa should produce a medium sized hay crop in late summer if not pastured. Good stands of grass may be fertilized in early spring to increase yields. If cut in late June the hay will be of fair quality and the possibilities for a second growth increased. Clover and alfalfa are more dependable than grass and will produce much more feed.

Summer seedings may also be made with the assistance of the Conservation program. The time should be applied in the spring and the seedings made following rye, oats, early cut hay, tobacco, sweet corn, or other early harvested crops. While summer seedings will produce little or no feed the same seator the possibilities for good hay and pasture the season following.


