

Government bends slid to new 1937 lows recently, but fiscal authorities said the new buying program was not designed to elevate prices or to peg the market at any particular point.

FLOUNDER OUTPUT Hartford, April 5—Winter floun-er production at the state marine ish hatchery at Noank may set an all time record this spring, the State Board of Fisheries and Game Without resorting to the use of adding machines, the board figures that 400,000,000 flounder or flatfish fry will be hatched and then planted in coastal waters by June.

Flounder production is calculated by measuring the quantity of eggs obtained from spawn-bearing fish. An ounce of spawn will average 48,000 eggs, according to Captain Frank N. Banning, in charge of ma-rine fisheries. Frank N. Banning, in charge of marine fisheries.

Up to the end of March, commercial netters had supplied the hatchery with 2,217 flounders for initial brood stock. A total of twice that number is expected to be available during the next few weeks while the flounder run is on.

In 1934, when the hatchery record of 345,765,000 flounders was established, brood stock made available during the season numbered 3,017. With prospects indicating a larger number of spawners being provided this year, a new record production of 400,000,000 fry is anticipated.

Flounder netting is Connecticut's most important commercial fishery and both flounder and lobster fry propagation at the state hatchery is propagation at the state hatchery is financed through special appropria-tions by the General Assembly.
