BRITAIN RUSHES BIGGEST WARSHIP TO SPAIN'S COAST

42,000 Ton Hood, Mightiest of All Battle Cruisers Joins Other Craft to Protect Empire's Shipping.

ON FIFTH DAY MADRID BATTLE KEEPS ITS PACE

Loyalists, Rebels Fight On at Close Range in Efforts to Seize or Hold a Position Commanding the City.

London, April 12.—(AP)—The Admiralty ordered the mightiest of British men-of-war to patrol station off the northern coast of Spain today to take any necessary action to protect British shipping from attack by insurgent Spanish warships on the high seas.

The action, decided at a hurriedly called Sunday Cabinet session, was regarded as a compromise answer to an insurgent warning of its fleet would permit British merchant vessels to enter the Bay of Biscay.

British, while ready to protect ships flying the Union Jack on the high seas, refused to permit British warships to enter Spanish territorial waters should they bearing news of the blockade.

Madrid, April 12.—(AP)—Government cannon hammered insurgent front lines in two vital sections of the battle of Madrid today. Both forces locked at close grips on the high ground of the city.

Ohawa, Ont., April 12.—(AP)—Four score employes workers and parts department employes went to work in the strike-closed General Motors plant today amid hiss and jeers from picket lines.

The production division, employing about 3,700 remained closed, however, by the strike for an agreement between General Motors and the United Automobile Workers of America.

In nearby Toronto, the Globe and Mail quoted Premier McGowan as saying he was "convinced" that the auto workers would not strike.

At Brussels, Belgium, Premier Zeeland Wins Election by Big Majority, Victory Is Celebrated.

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After many backdoor sessions, the union, however, made no physical attempt to bar the plant employes from going into the plant this morning.

Many of the strikers looked to Detroit for settlement of their four-day walkout.

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LONG WAITED OPINION DECIDES VITAL POINTS, SETTLES 5 KEY CASES

Senate Leaders Give Opinions On Rulings

In Epochal Decision Right of Labor Board to Regulate Employer-Employee Relationship Is Upheld; Decision Broadens Scope of Our Interstate Commerce.

Washington, April 12.—(AP)—The Supreme Court, in an epochal decision, upheld today the right of the National Labor Relations board to regulate employer-employee relationships in interstate commerce.

The decision broadened the scope of the board's jurisdiction beyond what opponents of the law contended was the proper boundary line.

In other decisions, the court held that the National Labor Relations board's jurisdiction over interstate commerce was not limited to interstate commerce.

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TEXANS ASSAIL COURT CHANGE, FLOUT ELECTION

Militant Band of Democrats Declares F. D. R.'s Plan Would Injure the Party, Labor Favored, One Says.

Washington, April 12.—(AP)—A militant band of Texas Democrats told the Senate Judiciary Committee today that the Act on the Reorganization of the Executive Branch would undermine constitutional liberties and damage the party irreparably.

I. L. James of Tyler, heading the 55 lawyers, merchants, farmers and clergymen, brought to the capital a letter which he estimated contained 25,000 signatures of persons in every section of the state.

"Some of these people say," he declared, "that if this plan goes through, you might as well write your names on the purple robes of royalty and make appropriations for the coronation."

James disputed assertions by supporters of the bill that the election would be a test on the issue. "London is not going to be affected by this," he said. "The chaotic conditions created by the court in past decisions have not been altered by this particular decision."

Senator Duff (D., Wis.), one of the group of senators uncommitted on the court bill, took the same view.

"It is likely to take the pressure off the proposal to change the court," he said.

The court's decision created a stir in the Senate. It was the first time since the AAA and NRA decisions that the Senate Judiciary committee had reported a bill.

Senator Connally (D., Tex.), one of the leaders in the opposition camp, said the decision would have a "profound effect" on those members of Congress still undecided on the court bill.

"It will show up the drive for the bill," Connally said. "An act with two bad times can't run as well as one with four good ones."

Senator La Follette (Prog., Wis.), one of the most ardent supporters of the bill, said the court's decision would have no influence on his own position.

"I am happy to hear they have confirmed for another time the judgment of the Supreme Court," he said.

REVIEWS ASSEMBLY
WORK FOR KIWANIS
Hearings Slowed Up, Says Representative Shea Because of Party Split.

An interesting resume of the workings of the 1937 General Assembly was given at the noon luncheon of the Kiwanis club today at the Manchester Y. M. C. A. by Representative William J. Shea. Representative Shea stated that hearings on bills in committee were slow on somewhat this year due to the fact that the House is strongly Republican and the Senate is Democratic.

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OLD AGE BENEFIT CLAIMS ARE FILED
Already 43 Have Been Made in State; \$9,000 Waiting Claimants at Present.

Hartford, April 12.—(AP)—The first claims have been filed in Connecticut for old age benefits under the Federal old-age benefits program. As of today, 43 claims have been made in the state, and \$9,000 is waiting claimants at present.

Forty-three such claims have been filed in Connecticut out of a total of 100 in the New England states, it was announced today by Francis J. C. Donohue, Hartford, chief of the Social Security Board. This was the first official statement regarding actual progress toward collecting benefits in the program which will start in June.

Some 44,000 lump-sum settlements will be made in New England, Mr. Donohue said. He pointed out that simplicity of the claims procedure reduces the cost of the program to the state and the federal government. The program is a simple statement by the employer.
