HEPBURN REFUSES CONFERENCE WITH LEWIS ORGANIZERS

Ontario Premier Tells News- men That "Neither Martin Nor Any Other Hiring" Will Take Part in Parley.

Toronto, Ont., April 16.—(AP)—Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario today served notice that neither Homer Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers, "nor any other hiring of John L. Lewis," would be admitted to a proposed General Motors strike peace conference in his office.

Hepburn, blunt spoken foe of Lewis' Committee for Industrial Organization, made this statement to newspapermen just as the General Motors strikes in Ontario, 32 miles east of here, greeted Martin with a parade.

Hepburn called the new peace conference last night after Martin and General Motors officials in Detroit announced that the Ontario strike, affecting 3,700 workers, would have to be settled in Canada.

The Premier invited C. H. Millard, president of the U.A.W. in Ontario; J. L. Cohen, union counsel; H. J. Carmichael, vice president and general manager of General Motors of Canada, Ltd.; and J. B. Highfield, plant manager of Ontario to the conference.

A similar conference broke down last Saturday when the Ontario union committee insisted on including Hugh Thompson, U.A.W.A. organizer.

WOMAN SAVES \$25,000 PAYROLL; CATCH BANDITS

Hides Money As Masked Thugs Enter the Office; Scream Frightens Them Off; Employee Is Wounded.

Bridgeport, April 16.—(AP)—The alertness of a woman employee frustrated the attempt of three armed, masked bandits to hold up the \$25,000 payroll at the Raybestos-Manhattan company plant here today after a factory hand was shot and slightly wounded.

Police said the three men were captured within an hour and a half and identified themselves as William C. Olah, 40; William Sherwood, 30, and Bronislav Szeliga, 30, all of this city.

Mrs. Susan Porter, secretary to an official of the company, was credited with having saved the money by slamming the door of her private office and hiding it in a desk drawer which the bandits failed to search. It had been delivered a few minutes previously by armed guards.

Wreck Switchboard
Police said Olah and Szeliga, one of whom carried a pistol and the other a sawed-off shotgun, temporarily disabled the telephone switchboard on the first floor of the plant and then went to the company offices on the third floor.

One cowed a number of employees with the shotgun, while the other conducted a futile search for the money.

Frightened by the screams of a woman employee, the bandits fled.

Police Lieut. James C. Bray said all three were picked up within an hour and a half and were charged on charges of robbery with violence. Bail was set at \$25,000 each.

SOUTHERNERS ANGRY AS LYNCH ACT IS PASSED

House Adopts Measure Hit- ting Officers Who Let Mobs Take Victims; Hard Senate Fight Looked For.

Washington, April 16.—(AP)—Congressional leaders predicted today that the first anti-lynching bill to pass the House in 15 years would encounter greater opposition in the Senate. Filibusters have killed every previous attempt to win Senate approval of such legislation. Even as the House adopted the Gavanon bill late yesterday, 277 to 119, Senator Borah (R., Idaho), criticized what he called an effort to "force through Congress an unjust, unconstitutional and, in my opinion, an unwarlike measure."

Southern senators were preparing to oppose the measure, forecasting warm sectional debate, similar to that which punctuated argument in the House.

Walter White, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said that although the legislation would not stop lynching, "it will check lynching and encourage respect for the law."

Directed At Officers
The Gavanon bill provides that an officer who permits a prisoner to escape his custody and be injured or put to death by a mob would be subject to a maximum fine of \$5,000 and a maximum prison term of from 5 to 25 years.

Participants in mob violence would be subject to similar prison terms, and the county in which a prisoner is seized or put to death would have to pay his family damages ranging from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

Representatives Sumners (D., Tex.), Rankin (D., Ga.), and Cawley (D., Ga.), led the southern opponents in contending the bill was directed at states which for years have been trying to cope with the problem of mob violence.

At one point, they succeeded in delaying the section compelling counties to pay damages to a victim's family, but it was reinstated later.

MOLA PREPARES FOR FINAL PUSH AGAINST BILBAO

Has Moved Headquarters to New Position; No News from British Ships That May Run the Blockade.

St. Jean de Luz, France, April 16.—(AP)—Gen. Emilio Mola, leader of the northern insurgent army, has moved to new advanced general headquarters on the Basque front, it was reported today, for a supreme push against fortified Bilbao. Official insurgent advisers said the Franco right-hand man was mapping his operations from new quarters in Alava province, which flanks the Basque province of Vizcaya on the south, and was waiting only for rains to end before launching the full force drive toward the Biscay coast.

Despite Basque denials, the insurgent reports insisted an advance party had explored Durango, the barrier city 16 miles southeast of the Basque capital on an improved highway. The detachment met no resistance, it was said, and returned to its base.

It was the second insurgent report in a week that the key city had been entered.

"Consolidating Positions"
Mola was described as consolidating his positions in the battle-torn mountains about Durango before attempting to occupy the town and drive onward against starvation-ridden Bilbao.

Senators and Representa- tives of Windham County Form Board of Inquiry; Determined to Get to the Bottom of Situation at the County Home, They Say.

State Capitol, Hartford, April 16.—(AP)—Senators and Representatives from Windham county authorized today the appointment of a board of inquiry to investigate the Windham County Home for Children.

Senator Pierre J. Laramee (D) of Willimantic was designated chairman of the board of nine members under a resolution providing for the investigation.

The resolution was approved unanimously at a county meeting after the General Assembly had adjourned for the week-end.

The board will comprise five Democrats and four Republicans.

Laramee designated those legislators to serve on the board with him: Senator Asa R. Scranton, Jr., (D) of South Woodstock; Representatives Dorothy J. Bartlett (D) of Putnam, Carl M. Sharpe (R) of Pomfret, T. Dennis Clarke (D) of Killingly, Henry J. Marchessault (R) of Plainfield, Fred A. Munyan (D) of Thompson, Jerome C. Keech (R) of Hampton, and Milo A. Appleby (R) of Canterbury.

Girls' Charges
The investigation authorized by the resolution resulted from charges lodged this week against the superintendent of the county home on complaint of two of his girl charges.

The resolution was introduced by Rep. Clarke, who said the board committee should continue its probe until it could give the home "a clean bill of health."

Rising to second the resolution, Rep. Sharpe, said he hoped the committee will "get to the bottom of this pot and see that it is scoured clean."

Senator Laramee, after the resolution had been unanimously adopted, said he was determined that "the committee will be thorough, and asserted "we intend to get to the bottom of this situation."

Following the adoption of the resolution, the county delegation went into an executive session.

Text of Resolution
The Representatives and Senators of Windham county, in joint county meeting hereby resolve that there shall be established a county legislative board of inquiry; it shall consist of nine members from its members; the county chairman Senator Laramee shall be the chairman of this board, including the remaining eight members. Said board shall act under the provisions as set forth in Section 216 of the revised General Statutes of 1930 of the State of Connecticut.

The county treasurer is hereby authorized to draw his order in payment of all necessary expenses incurred by this board; the sum of five hundred dollars is hereby appropriated to carry out the purposes of this resolution.

Sec. 216 provides, among other things, that the Senators and Representatives of each county, or a committee thereof may investigate the affairs of such county, including the conduct of any county officers, and to that end may, subpoena, require the attendance of witnesses to testify before such examining body and the production of book papers or any other thing necessary to such investigation.

The section provides also that in the event a witness refuses to testify, the investigating body can obtain a capias to force him to appear. If the witnesses then refuse to testify, the section sets forth, he may be committed to jail.

MEETING DELAYED

Today's conference originally was slated for 11 a. m. but Hepburn, arriving at the Parliament building in Queen's Park at 10:45, told reporters the meeting would be delayed pending the action of union stewards in Ontario on his invitation.

Hepburn chuckled what he said was a police report that "only" 500 strikers greeted Martin when he arrived at Ontario. Then he turned his gaze on Mayor Hall of Ontario, who has sided with the strikers.

Hepburn last night issued a statement that Hall still owed the province \$250 he had collected in fees before he was dismissed as crown attorney in 1934.

Produce Papers
Told by a reporter that Hall denied this, Hepburn produced a large file of correspondence, read excerpts, and said it proved Hall's debt.

"They all say I'm a liar!" he exclaimed.

Yesterday Ian Mackenzie, Federal minister of national defense, denied Hepburn's statement that the Federal government had promised Hepburn additional police aid.

As a result, Hepburn asked the 100 Royal Canadian mounted police sent here at Hepburn's request for use in case of violence at Ontario.

New York, April 16.—(AP)—A strike of seamen and wireless operators which threatened to tie up 17 ships, two of them richly-appointed transatlantic liners, was settled early today at a conference attended by the regional director of the National Labor Relations Board.

Two vessels already lay idle at adjoining piers in New York harbor when an agreement to terminate the short-lived walkout was announced by Mrs. Elinore M. Herick, the board's New York representative.

COMPROMISES ON COURT IGNORED BY PRESIDENT

Washington, April 16.—(AP)—Informed Senators said today that many of the compromises being publicly discussed as compromises for the Roosevelt court bill were submitted privately to the White House weeks ago and have been ignored.

Nevertheless, talk of compromise persisted as the Senate Judiciary committee neared the end of its long hearings on the court measure.

James E. Freeman, Episcopal bishop of the Washington diocese, was the opposition's leading witness today in what may prove to be the last session of the hearings. He was to be followed by former Senator Brookhart, of Iowa, a supporter of the bill.

The committee will meet tomorrow in closed session to vote on a motion by Senator Hughes (D., Del.) to close the testimony. Members said the motion probably would carry despite protests of opposition leaders that they have invited a number of additional witnesses.

BIG RAIL PENSION HITS U. S. BUDGET

Proposal to Refund Taxes of \$100,000 Forces Treasury to Re-check Figures.

Washington, April 16.—(AP)—A new railroad pension proposal punched a \$100,000,000 hole in administration revenue estimate today forcing budget bureau officials to recheck Federal income and outgo for this fiscal year.

Chairman Doughton (D-NC) of the House ways and means committee, harmonizing difference between the Treasury and railroad management and labor, introduced yesterday a rail retirement program which would give the roads and their workers tax refunds of about \$50,000,000 each.

Doughton said the new plan, designed to replace the court-contested 1935 retirement legislation, was acceptable to the carriers, rail brotherhoods and the administration.

The Treasury, objecting to a voluntary pension plan formulated by management and labor, originally contended no tax refunds should be granted.

World Lift Rates
Although ignoring this, Doughton's program would lift the tax rates to meet Treasury standards.

In his January budget estimates, President Roosevelt forecast taxes under the 1935 Act would put \$134,900,000 in the Treasury this fiscal year. The revised retirement program would whittle this income to about \$30,000,000.

NAZI PROPAGANDA WORRIES RUMANIA

Bucharest, Rumania, April 16.—(AP)—A special session of the Rumanian Cabinet decided today to "repress with strongest measures" disturbances which have been sponsored by the pro-Nazi "Iron Guard" since Prince Nicholas was read out of the royal family.

The Fascist guard organization seized upon Nicholas' ouster last Saturday as the occasion for "disturbing" demonstrations, officials said in an effort to embarrass the government.

The Guardia, these officials asserted, are in reality little interested in the former prince and his struggle with King Carol, his brother, for royal recognition of Nicholas' comonomer wife. But they used the incident to further their own struggle for a Nazi-like dictatorship.

"The whole government is misled in a determination that anti-Rumanian agitation shall not disturb the state," Premier George Tatarescu said after the Cabinet meeting.

Ready for Sacrifices
"We are prepared to make sacrifices," another government spokesman asserted that while the Iron Guard was unruly, the situation in no sense

THREE SLAYERS EXECUTED BY HUMANE ELECTRIC CHAIR

Chicago, April 16.—(AP)—Three murderers of policemen died in the electric chair today in Cook county's first test of its "humanized" execution.

Mechanical improvements on the electric chair to speed final preparations also were designed to "humanize" the ordeal. The time elapsing between the doomed men's arrival in the death chamber and the application of the current averaged 30 seconds.

The renovated chair has clasps screwed to its arms for straps which circle the victim's chest, thus eliminating possible fumbling by guards who strap the men in. Its mechanical seat and arm attachments are worked by spring levers, and the straps have no buckles. Wires in the seat are hidden beneath a mat.

Schuster, who murdered, Police-
