Sugar in Blood Determines Effects Of A Cocktail

Washington, April 26.—(AP)—The effects caused by drinking a cocktail or a nightcap are determined by the amount of sugar in the blood at the time, two Yale scientists said today.

Dr. Howard W. Haggard and Dr. Leo A. Greenberg told the National Academy of Sciences that in some diabetics patients the tolerance of alcohol is distinctly influenced by insulin or lack of it.

The experiments were conducted with rats, but the scientists indicated they also had experimented on themselves.

"We have evidence that men react differently," they reported.

Under ordinary conditions, they said, a concentration of from nine to nine and one-half milligrams of alcohol per cubic centimeter of blood will kill a rat, when there is 0.1 per cent of sugar in the blood. When the concentration of sugar is lowered to .07 per cent by fast-

TOWN'S PROSPERITY SOON TO GET BLOW

Tax Receipts Have Been Greater Than Before But Notes Are Soon Due

Although the town's tax receipts for this fiscal year have been far in excess of any previous year, the municipality's mounting prosperity will be short-lived.

During May and August the town will have to pay out a total of \$266,276.25 for temporary notes, bond issues and interest.

On bond issues the town will pay \$200,000 next month. During the same month payments on temporary notes will be \$225,000 and interest payments will total \$11,276.25.

In August the town will make further payments of \$120,000 on temporary notes.

If tax receipts during the remainder of the fiscal year parallel, it is expected that the town will pay off an additional \$100,000 on school district temporary notes which were taken over through school consolidation.

Of the \$276,000 in temporary notes to be paid next month and in August, \$70,000 was borrowed at the end of the last fiscal year to balance the books for that period.

The remaining \$206,000 has been borrowed from time to time since 1932 to finance the cost of town government this fiscal year.
