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SENATORS POSTPONE ACTION ON FINANCE AND CONTROL BILL

But Approve Three Other Reorganization Measures at Brief Session; Devin Explains Finance Changes.

State Capitol, Hartford, May 6.—(AP)—Three reorganization bills affecting the state's financial administration were approved today by the Senate, but action was deferred on a major bill.

Senator Raymond, Devin, Democrat Floor leader, explained off the floor that the Senate will not be prepared to strike out from the Finance and Control bill a provision calling for the appointment of a director by the finance commissioner.

Originally, it was proposed to establish a personnel division in the finance department. The amended bill, however, created a director to direct the commissioner for the appointment of the director with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The proposed amendment, Devin said, would prevent a difference between the civil service and the finance department. The amended bill before the General Assembly's Finance and Control.

DUKE'S WEDDING GIFTS SCRUTINIZED BY POLICE

Fear That Bomb May Be Sent Disguised as a Gift; Edward Composes Wedding March on Bagpipes.

Monte, France, May 6.—(AP)—Special precautions were taken today to safeguard the Duke of Windsor and Wallis Warfield Simpson when they arrived in London.

Police watched all packages addressed to the Duke and Duchess of Windsor and Queen Elizabeth II. A bomb disguised as a wedding gift, which he refused to accept, was delivered to him by Mrs. Simpson.

TRUCK WITH CLOAK CO. SUPPLIES BURNS
Office Partitions Somewhat Damaged in Blaze on Pine Street Yesterday.

A four ton truck owned by Frank Amagio of Elm street, New Britain, loaded with office partitions and equipment of the Independent Clock Company, which is moving from New Britain to the street mill on Pine street, caught fire at 4:30 yesterday afternoon resulting in an alarm being turned in from Box 27, at Pine and Walnut streets, following a still alarm telephone message.

The truck, standing on Pine street just south of the driveway leading into the receiving doors of the mill, was burning for some time in the yard unloading. The driver of the truck, Frank Amagio, of 247 Washington street, New Britain, noticed flames shooting out from under the hood and up the back, catching fire to the covering on the furniture that was in the truck.

He tried to extinguish the flames, but the gasoline line to the pump and ladder truck, and also No. 4's ladder truck. The fire was extinguished by using the water tanks from the different pieces of apparatus and a small amount of chemicals. The damage to the furniture in the automobile was not heavy and was taken from the truck by men employed by the Clock company and carried into the mill. Some of the office partitions were broken.

The moving of machinery from the factory building in New Britain where the plant has been located since Monday afternoon, on the 2nd of May, 1937, was completed on Tuesday afternoon, after the plant had been moved to the new location on Franklin avenue. About 100 men and women were working on the plant until 6 o'clock Tuesday night, unloading the machinery that arrived from the factory building.

One of the representatives of the company said yesterday afternoon that the machinery from the factory plant would be set up as soon as possible and the plant would be under way within two weeks. The company which they own and operate in New Britain is the Rockville City Hospital.
