The Family **Doctor**

PROTECTING CHILDREN
FROM BHEUMATIC FEVER.

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN.

In the prevention of rheumatic fever, attention must be given to improving the general health of chil-

The child should lead a quiet, restful life. He must have plenty of rest and recreation.

Fatigue and exhaustion interfere with a child's digestion, and leave him prey to infection. For children who are exceedingly nervous and who tire easily, a rest period of a half hour before and after meals is recommended.

Damp, wet clothing always should be removed from a child when he comes indoors, and he should always wear enough clothing

sould always wear enough clothing There should be plenty of fresh

air in his sleeping quarters, but this air should not be damp or irritating. Children who suffer from sinus dis-

children who suffer from sinus diseases or other disturbances of the nose and throat sometimes are harmed by parents' over-enthusiasm in the matter of providing freesh air. If a child has a diet with plenty of milk, butter, eggs, leafy green vegetables, fruits, cold liver oil and other foods providing adequate amounts of protein, carbohydrate, fat, mineral salts and vitamins, his nutrition will be satisfactory.

If the youngster has a tendency to be persistently underweight, if he eats without appetite and if his digestion is constantly disturbed, he is more ilkely to become a victim of heart disease than otherwise.

Particularly important is prompt attention to every cold and sore throat. Children who suffer constantly from sore throats or infections of the nose and shauses should be carefully watched by a physician and, if possible, should be moved to a warm climate so they may have a better opportunity for complete recovery.

There is no certain cure for rheumalic fever; no drug or serum that can be depended upon to have specific effect. The child, as has already been said, must be put to bed promptly if this condition is noted.

lewly Developed Tube Shows Images On a Screen 18 by 24 Inches Square.

New York, May 12.—(AP)—Tel vision on a screen—images 18 by 24 inches aquare produced by a newly developed cathode ray tube — was demonstrated to the silver anniver-Radio Engineers here today. The picture has a brightness equal to that of home movies. By increasing the distance from the screen it is possible to obtain one as large as three by four feet good enough to be viewed by an audience of several hundred.

Enlargement is obtained through a simple optical system placed before the fluorescent end of the tube, where the original picture appears at the small size of 1½ by 2½ inches.

Details of the new tube, which is the result of several years' research in the laboratories of the Radio Corporation of America, were outlined in papers written by Dr. W. H. Zworykin, W. H. Painter and Dr. R. R. Law, the men directly concerned with its design.

In its the outgrowth of the "kinescope," the television receiving tube that paints images on its flat end but does not project them. The largest "kinescope" to date with a viewing end 15 inches in diameter, permits pictures approximately 9 by 12 inches.

While the projection tube is re garded in scientific circles as a dis-tinct advancement, Dr. Law said it had not yet reached the stage where it can be used outside the laboratory. Work is being continued to develop the luminscent material of the fluorescent screen which will withstand the terrific bombardment of the electrons that build up the image.




