TAKING FOR WASTE

Connecticut is a little state. With out breaking a speed law you can drive a car through its greatest dimension from west to east.

It is compact and highly organized. Without looking at a map you may scan it mentally with considerable degree of accuracy.

It would seem as if the kind of operating a state of that kind, where everything is practically under the eye of everybody, should be pretty low. Does it work that way?

And why is that? It is because we got in the habit, years and years ago, not only of creating more and more and bigger and bigger public services, but of making the jobs of providing those services easier and easier.

Now indeed the social butterflies have got something to do. Perhaps the Windsor pair may be coming to America to live. Anyhow the state is likely to be necessary to build a third.

The state does not grow in population anything like in proportion as it increases its services, its employees and consequently its expenditures.

That is why we have this problem of taxation, for which Governor Cross finds no better solution than another addition to the gasoline tax.

Senator J. Kenneth Bradley, national president of Young Republican Clubs—when he demands that there be no increase in taxes of any kind for state income, and that the departments be compelled to get along on the income from present taxation—is not closer to the right track than anyone else.

Instead of there being two alternatives, laying new taxes or going deeper into debt, there is in order to live within the income from present taxation it would be necessary with a particularly careful service, just as an institutional character.

If just about one-half of the present state payroll who do not have a day's work for a day's pay were to be dismissed with the other half required to do a day's work, it is highly probable that the
