New Haven, July 3.—(AP)—Among the pests of dahlias that growers and home gardeners must watch for are the potato leafnoppers. These insects appear on the plants in late June and the eggs and nymphs are found during July and August. Mr. Neely Turner at the agricultural experiment station at New Haven has experimented with control of these pests and reports results in the forthcoming state entomologist's report, Station Bulletin 396.

Potato leafhoppers have injured dahlias severely in the past few seasons, Mr. Turner reports. The plants at the station farm at Mount Carmel are now infested and a good crop of insects is expected later in the month. Some varieties of dahlias appear to be more susceptible than others. 
