ROBOT RADIO ALARMS AT SEA ARE EFFECTIVE

Two Cases Cited Where Automatic Signals Reached Ships Hundreds of Miles Away.

New York, July 12 (AP)—American radio alarms on ocean routes are being remarkably efficient in picking up distress calls at sea, Charles J. Pannell, president of the Radio Marine Corporation of America, said today. The radio robot proved its effectiveness in two recent emergency cases, he said. Signals sent out by the freighter Guardian when it was grounded June 30 at Lobsenz Bay, Cuba, set off automatic alarms on vessels 80 to 1,000 miles away. Nearly 300 ships have been equipped with the alarm, which provides 24-hour vigilance, Pannell said.
