



The Regent's veto power is being enormously increased. Under the old constitution, when a bill did not suit him, he could within 60 days send it back to Parliament. If both send it back to Parliament. If both houses passed it over his veto, he had to proclaim it as law within 15 days. Under the proposed amend-ments, if a bill does not suit him, he has six months in which to send it back to Parliament unsigned. If it is passed over his veto, he has another six months in which once more to send it back unsigned. If it is then passed once more, the veto power ends and he must promulgate the bill as law within 15 days.

This increased veto power is meant not so much as a compliment meant not so much as a compliment to Horthy, but as a way to safe-guard the political power of Magyar nobles. In Hungary at the present time there is a secret ballot only in the larger cities. In the country and small towns, voting is viva voce and the nobles and big landlords can easily intimidate the peasants and small traders into voting "right." Premier Daranyi, a favorite with the peasants, proposes to make the secret ballot universal. 




