for war along the entire CIO front. Francis P. Fenlon, New England representative of the A. F. of L., announced inauguration of the campaign "immediately."

"The C. I. O. has continued to raid and tear asunder craft unions," he said, adding many textile locals have solicited us to take them on."

He said the C. I. O. has demonstrated its attitude in its tactics and shoe center, but for the first time in the Federation's history it was expected no delegates would represent the great textile industry.

Fenlon said, however, two Philadelphia men might be admitted as delegates under a new Federal charter and that a charter was being granted at Dudley.

New Textiles Union

When the movement spreads, he said, a new international textile union will be created.

That would be followed, he added, by other internationals as the campaign spreads into rubber, automobile, electric and other plants.

Twelve new organizers have been added in New England in the last six weeks, he said.

John F. O'Connell, president of the Massachusetts Federation, said that a "harmonious convention" to unify an aggressive campaign against the C. I. O., financed largely by the five per cent membership assessment approved by the A. F. of L. Executive Council in May.

He said he also would ask the convention to take the offensive against Communist and Fascist, the former, he declared, "showing its head in the undisciplined mass organization movement" and the latter represented by the "Johnston citizens vigilante committee."

On orders of the National Executive Council, the State Federation recently suspended 30 locals for C. I. O. affiliation and 18 others, mostly textile unions, had been dropped for refusal to pay dues.
