CONSTANT GUARD KEPT OVER WIFE MURDERER

Stanley Wrubel's Condition, After Suicide Attempt, Is Reported to Be Only Fair.

A week ago tomorrow morning Stanley Wrubel shot and killed his wife at their home, 45 Edmunston street. He attempted to take his own life, first by shooting and then by drinking a poison. Taken to Memorial hospital he was treated for the poison that he took and has since been under police guard night and day.

It is not as yet known when he will be sufficiently improved to be able to appear in police court and answer to a charge of first degree murder. The warrant so charging him has been drawn and Prosecutor, Attorney George C. Lester was present at the autopsy held at the coroner's office.

Chief of Police Samuel G. Gordon has had an officer on guard at the hospital every hour since Wrubel was admitted.

Because Wrubel's mouth and throat were badly burned by the liquid he drank he has not been able to eat solid foods and his condition is only fair.
