CHINESE BARRICADE PART OF SHANGHAI AS FIGHT FLARES THERE

Shanghai, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Japanese Marines and Chinese forces fought a sharp skirmish in the very environs of Shanghai tonight, with a Japanese officer and a Chinese soldier reported killed.

The semi-military Chinese Peace Preservation Corps, which Japan blamed for the airport clash, at once threw up barricades to block off wide highways in northern Shanghai from adjoining Japanese populated territory.

The Japanese troops, commanded by Major-General T. Kawabe, entered the city from the north, and the Japanese army headquarters of the Peiping and Tientsin, China, today reported that the Japanese had captured the airport.




