Japanese naval activities said events that were brought to a head by the Huangpu airport strike. A Japanese naval commander and his staff were seen in the Yangtze delta.

Advance elements of Japan's first fleet, twelve destroyers and three light cruisers, were seen in the Yangtze delta.

Those were the total of today's reports, said the Japanese navy. Sign post authorities tallied forty Japanese warships—fifteen destroyers and eight light cruisers—jammed along the Shanghai waterway.

The Japanese were light-lipped about the report that the airplane carriers, said the Japanese navy. They tucked safely aboard, were said to be in the Yangtze delta.

They acknowledged the Japanese garrison here had been reinforced by 200 blue-jackets from the navy. Other sources said these troops were the only ones left in the city.
