AGITATES NEW YORK

Four-Year-Old Girl Is Latest
Victim; Authorities Join in
Drive Against Degenerates.

New York, Aug. 14—(AP)—New
York city's fourth murder of a little girl in five months welded police, legislative, penological, and judicial forces today in an unprecedented drive against crimes of sex degenerates.

While investigation of the latest killing centered about the story of a 38-year-old WPA project painter who told police he found the body. Mayor F. H. LaGuardis and Police drew plans for a new bureau to keep all known degenerates under continual surveillance.


