

It must be pointed out, however, that there may arise certain conditions under which it is best to harvest earlier than three weeks after topping. If the leaves are starving for lack of food, due to application of too little fertilizer or leacning of nitrogen, and the plant is turning pale, nothing will be gained by waiting. Or if dry weather is "firing" the lower leaves, it is sometimes best to harvest at once.

The principle reason why the grower harvests early is because of fear of hail or wind storms. He gets so nervous thinking about them that he can't sleep at night until he has the crop under the shingles. Another reason for early harvesting is the belief that the cure is better in the hot weather or early August. This objection, however, is offset by the more rapid cure of the riper tobacco.
