It costs \$40 a ton to get supplies in here from Seattle; air freight from Anchorage is 48 cents a pound.

Begular boats do not call here

Regular boats do not call here, but three small trading ships come from Seattle. The bay is shallow, and supplies have to be lightered ashore on barges. There has never been a tourist in Platinum.

Nearly everybody who comes to Platinum comes by airplane, even the lowlest worker. There is no regular air service here, but a plane or two drops in from Anchorage, soo miles away, about every other lar boats do not call here, himself.

600 miles away, about every other paying good prices for deer tails be day. They land in the bay on floats, cause the soft, waterproof hair or on the flat "spit" on wheels.






