HYDRO STATIONS SHATTER RECORD

Connecticut Water Powered Electric Plants Turned Out Amazing Half-Year Total.

Production of electricity by the hydro electric plants in Connecticut reached its highest mark in history during the first six months of the present year, surpassing by a very wide margin all previous records for a six-month period, according to statistics compiled from the monthly reports on power production of the Federal Power Commission.

The total amount of electricity produced by the water-powered plants of the state during the first half of 1937 was 218,488,000 kilowatt hours. This was 44 percent greater than the production of the same generating stations in the corresponding period of 1936, and far above the hydro output of any previous six-month period. In the past, the first half years have run fairly evenly with but slight variations, last year's first six months being 192,000,000 kilowatt hours.
